## Pledge Summary

Sterling Heights is a young city, incorporated on July 1, 1968. The city operates with a "Council/City Manager" form of government. The council is elected by residents, and it sets the policies, enacts the ordinances and adopts the city budget. The city manager is responsible for carrying out the policies set by the council and for supervising all of the departments of city government. Sterling Heights is the third largest in area and the fourth largest in population in the state of Michigan. Sterling Heights has a population of 134,346 (2020 census) people living within 36.8 square miles. Sterling Heights is home to more than 3,500 commercial and industrial businesses. Sterling Heights is located just 20-35 minutes northeast of downtown Detroit in the county of Macomb. The hard work and dedication of our professional staff and community volunteers is responsible for the extensive list of awards earned by the organization.

**Please describe when the lots were converted to monarch habitat and the planned maintenance schedule.**

The Macomb County Public Works Office used \$1.82 million in grants to transform two miles of the 5.2-mile Sterling Relief Drain in Sterling Heights, utilizing green infrastructure to better serve the community. The project is focused on water quality and improving the operation of the drain, but will include the creation of a butterfly "flyway" as a side benefit. The grants will paid for two miles of upgrades along the drain, which runs east-west through Sterling Heights, roughly halfway between 15 Mile Road and Metropolitan Parkway. The work will include "day-lighting" portions of the drains central channel - making that area appear like an intermittent stream that will often be dry - and planting more than 5,000 trees and bushes in the drain property. As part of the final landscaping of the project, MCPWO will plant a mixture of milkweed and other pollinating plants that are attractive to monarch butterflies. The plant mix will run the length of the project and create a monarch butterfly breeding area and potentially a butterfly flyway
