Lorain is a city of approximately 65,000 residents on the coast of Lake Erie. Last fall we developed a pollinator garden across from our city hall and hope to have a dedication ceremony this spring.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

Our first habitat was begun in Fall of 2021 on a greenspace located on one of the most visible sites within City of Lorain: the northeast corner of Broadway and West Erie Avenue, across from Lorain City Hall. This is one of the most heavily traveled areas within the city. The space was dedicated as Marie Bonaminio Memorial Garden Park in May of 2022. This was our first attempt at creating a pollinator habitat, and we were advised to monitor this site for a full season prior to committing to the creation of additional sites. We're thrilled to report that Marie Bonaminio Memorial Garden Park is thriving! We're now ready to extend our Monarch Pledge to include additional parks, and twelve parks within the city have been designated as future pollinator gardens. Cultivation of these gardens will begin this Fall for Spring 2023 growth!

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

We will be placing pollinator gardens in all areas of the city through our Adopt-A-Pollinator Garden initiative. The various neighborhoods include those with low-income housing and communities of color.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Our community lies along the shores of Lake Erie and is one of the monarchs' first stops after crossing the lake from Canada. We know they require plenty of fresh food after their long journey, and we wanted to give them a full buffet. Everybody loves fresh food!

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We formed a Butterfly Committee of several dedicated monarch enthusiasts in late 2020. Our committee includes members of city administration and staff as well as several like-minded members of the Lorain community. We are fortunate to have "resident expert" Jackie Conrad on the committee. Jackie teaches at a nearby elementary school and has included monarch conservation in her curriculum for many years. Jackie also maintains a large monarch habitat on her own property and has seen it expand and prosper over the years. Jackie's knowledge of monarchs and pollinators has been invaluable. We were also very fortunate to enlist the help of Dave Riddell of Ohio Prairie Nursery. Dave has been instrumental in helping us achieve our goals. Dave visited our site in Summer of 2021 and was able to give us site-specific expert advice on prepping, cultivating, seeding, planting and maintaining our initial monarch habitat. We relied heavily on Dave's expert advice every step along the way! In addition to Jackie and Dave, we have collected and referenced an incredible amount of literature on pollinators and pollinator gardens, including information from National Wildlife Federation, Ohio Prairie Nursery, The Pollination Project, US Fish & Wildlife Service, USDA Forest Service, Pollinator Pathway, Pollinator Partnership and Pollinator.com.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Following the success of our first butterfly garden, we have petitioned organizations within the community to assist in broadening our pollinator garden program. We've asked organizations to "adopt-a-pollinator-garden", and have had tremendous response to this request: twelve out of twelve proposed butterfly habitats have been adopted!!! We're excited to enlist the community's help in developing these new gardens this year and even more excited to witness the birth of the twelve gardens this coming Spring!

We will be placing pollinator gardens in all areas of the city through our Adopt-A-Pollinator Garden initiative. Twelve gardens have been adopted by community organizations. The organizations include Lorain Rotary Club, Lorain Lions Club, Lorain County Community Action Agency, Lorain City Schools, Mercy Healy Partners, Little Lighthouse Learning Center Preschool, Congregacion El Faro Mision Cristiana Church, Valor Home Veteran's Support Group, and City of Lorain employees. Seeding day at these 12 adopted gardens will be held during the week of December 5, 2022.

Two large sets of butterfly wings are being crafted from wood to be placed at our Marie Bonaminio Memorial Pollinator Garden Park site. There will be a four foot child-size and 6 foot adult-size set of wings. The wings are currently constructed and the wood has been primed. The final paint job is underway and will be finalized in time for Spring 2023 installation. The wings will be painted to mimic monarch butterfly wings. These will be installed at the garden site and will allow a unique photo opportunity for our residents and visitors alike.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

Our first pollinator garden was planted in early December 2021 across from Lorain City Hall at 200 West Erie Avenue, at the foot of Charles Berry Bascule Bridge. This is one of the most heavily travelled intersections in the city and is located behind a large sculpture "LORAIN" sign. The Lorain sign is a popular photo stop for residents and visitors alike and has drawn quite a crowd to our butterfly garden! The garden is also on the walkway to our largest outdoor venue, Black River Landing which hosts Lorain County's largest outdoor concert series, Rockin' On The River. The butterfly garden is in the heart of it all!

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

We started a Butterfly Committee which includes members of our city government along with a few interested citizens. We're a group of seven members total who meet monthly to discuss future plans and to monitor and maintain our current garden. We've recruited 10 organizations who have pledged to "adopt-a-garden" and we look forward to walking them through the first steps of creating 12 new garden sites.
