## Pledge Summary

The City of Lorain planted its first pollinator garden last year across from City hall. We then formed public private partnerships with 12 businesses and nonprofits to add 12 more pollinator gardens throughout our City. We also provided American Rescue Funds to the Little Lighthouse Daycare program to add a pollinator garden and nature area next to their facility.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Convert vacant lots to monarch habitat.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

We have placed pollinator gardens in parks throughout the city within low-income neighborhoods and more affluent neighborhoods alike. We have reached out to members of all areas within the Lorain community to inform and educate them on the plight of the monarch and all pollinators and to encourage creation of pollinator gardens on personal property. The community has been very receptive and eager to do more.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

Being located on the shores of Lake Erie, we are directly on the "monarch trail" and are a much needed stop on the monarch's journey across the lake from Canada. We realize the need to protect and assist our pollinators in order to save the planet from a slow destruction. Every little bit helps!

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

Information and online courses provided by the Pollinator Partnership have been invaluable resources. On a local level, we've had the unwavering support of Dave Riddell and Ohio Prairie Nursery who have assessed our sites and offered suggestions to ensure the success of each garden. We also purchase our native seeds from Ohio Prairie Nursery (Open Seed).

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

Interest in the pollinator gardens and monarch conservation has definitely increased this year! We've been contacted by the Lorain Public Library System to partner in upcoming monarch conservation and other pollinator projects. Lorain County Health has enlisted our help to start their own pollinator garden at their Lorain facility. Our gardens are getting noticed, and interest is growing!

The conversion began in December of 2022 and began full-throttle in November 2023. A waterline is being installed and will be ready for spring planting in 2024. The design includes large boulders and rock formations which have been put in place. There is a walkway in place. The first phase of the project will be completed following planting of the milkweed and other pollinator friendly plants in the spring.

**Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)**

The demonstration garden is located on the northeast corner of Broadway Avenue and West Erie Avenue. It is located behind our new script Lorain sign, a photo stop for tourists and locals alike. It is at the foot of the iconic Charles Berry Bascule Bridge, one of the most defining symbols of our city. The garden sits near where the Black River meets Lake Erie. This is a resting area for monarchs after their long journey across the lake from Canada during migration.

The City of Lorain Administration along with various department heads, council persons, our Lorain Senior Center, Lorain Arts Council, Firefish Organization, and our Butterfly Committee came together to make this project a reality.

These groups planted and maintain their own "adopted garden". The Lorain Parks Department does all mowing for all of the gardens. City of Lorain has 54 parks, many of which are simply green spaces. Parks employees spend countless hours mowing these unused spaces. By designating a portion of this green space as pollinator gardens, we are contributing to the health of our planet and the monarch butterfly by adding beneficial food plants and eliminating carbon emissions from mowers. It's a win/win!

**Please describe the community art project that was implemented in your community and how it contributed to cultural awareness and recognition (e.g., number of art installations, type of art).**

This project was the brainchild of Joan Perch of Lorain Firefish Arts. The wings were designed by local artist Ryan Craycraft and were cut and assembled by JR Lee and members of the Lorain Senior Center. All materials were purchased by the City of Lorain Parks Department. The entire project was coordinated by City of Lorain Public property Manager Lori Garcia with the support of Lorain Mayor Jack Bradley. The wings will be placed on permanent concrete pads (already in place) at the pollinator garden on the northeast corner of Broadway & West Erie Avenues. They will provide a photo opportunity for both adults and children as we have both small and large sets of wings. There are also swing benches and stationary benches on the perimeter of the garden to provide visitors to the garden a place to rest and reflect on the beauty of the garden and its inhabitants.
