Action Items Committed for 2024

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

We've reached out to the entire Lorain community through our Lorain Parks & Rec webpage and our social media pages. We've cooperated with the Lorain Public Library system to help distribute educational materials and programs to all members of the Lorain community. We encouraged cleanup and maintenance of pollinator gardens on "Lorain Beautiful Day", an event that is open to residents of all areas and neighborhoods throughout our city.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

As we begin cultivating more gardens, we are seeing more and more monarchs and other butterflies, birds, bees (and even bats), and this encourages us to do even more. We are loving the positive change in our environment! Our children are becoming familiar with pollinators. Monarchs are no longer a rare spotting- we are seeing them consistently!

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

The amount and quality of information available on the web has been invaluable. We'd love to see more free resources (including free to print) that could be made available to our community and would help encourage all community members to engage in our pollinator endeavors.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

It's working!!!! We are seeing more Monarchs!!! We still get excited when we see them- which is amazing, but the hope is that someday the monarch sightings will be commonplace! We hope to NEVER take the monarch and other butterflies/bees/insects for granted ever again and to appreciate them for the precious resource that they are.

We currently have 28 educational garden signs located throughout the City of Lorain at each of our 15 gardens. The signs signify the importance of each habitat, the lifecycle of the monarch, and the importance of native plants to the monarch and other pollinator species. The signage also informs guests to the garden that the sometimes seemingly "unkempt" appearance of each garden is normal and necessary. Each is beautiful in its own way!

The Lorain Parks & rec Department winterized our pollinator gardens for the first time this year. The gardens were mowed down, leaving the stems as long as our mowers allowed in order to provide a Winter habitat for the insects that will house themselves under clippings and in the stems of plants. We will also be overseeding when the weather permits in order to assure us of more vibrant colors come spring. The yellow yarrow has taken over a few of our gardens, and while the yarrow is gorgeous, we hope to see some purples, pinks, and blues come Spring!

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.

The City of Lorain Street Department installed a new pathway through the Bonaminio Pollinator garden this Fall. They also installed benches so garden visitors could relax at the site and enjoy the beauty of the flora and fauna. We installed accessible ramps from the curbsways to allow access for people of all abilities. The Parks & Rec Department will work with a local GirlScout troop and volunteers to oversee the garden in the coming weeks.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and associated opportunities to create monarch habitat.

Landscape architect Kevin O'Brien designed this pollinator meadow at Willow Park in Lorain. This was a project brought to fruition through the donation efforts of many individuals and community groups. This was our first garden that was created using plants instead of growing from seed. We're excited to see how the plants fare over the Ohio winter and can't wait to see them reemerge in Spring! We are also in the process of creating 2 monarch habitat gardens within the Lorain Sports Complex (Campana Park) under the guidance of Kate Golden, Lorain's Stormwater Engineer. These two gardens will be widely viewed by the many visitors to our sports complex. We had over 8,000 visitors to our complex in 2024!

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The Marie Bonaminio memorial Pollinator Garden was created 3 years ago as our first butterfly habitat. In the years since, we have continued to enhance the garden to create an educational attraction for the citizens of Lorain. This garden is located directly across the street from Lorain City Hall and is adjacent to Lorain's most prominent intersection for the highest visibility in the city. The garden features a walking path, bench seating, butterfly sculptures, an iconic "Lorain" sign, and several swing benches overlooking the gorgeous plants and beautiful Lake Erie. You can't enter our town without seeing the pollinator garden! Beyond the garden to the north, off the shore of Lake Erie is Lorain most recognized landmark- the Lorain Lighthouse. From our swing benches, visitors are able to view the sunset across the water and watch as the lighthouse lights up with a light display that changes with the holidays and seasons.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

Mayor Jack Bradley and his wife Debora were two of the people who were instrumental in bringing the garden to life. Members of the mayor's administration along with City of Lorain Employees (United Steelworkers Local 6621) have contributed to the garden's growth and upkeep. The Lorain Parks & Recreation Department, under the direction of Public Property Director Lori Garcia has worked tirelessly to ensure that our garden is properly maintained. A volunteer committee of concerned citizens was formed (Lorain Butterfly Committee) to ensure that our gardens continue to expand.

Please describe the groups you engaged with and how you engaged with these groups below.

We've engaged with Lorain City Schools, local daycares, Lorain Rotary, Lorain Lions, local churches, and other local organizations who have expressed an interest in pollinators. Most recently, we began working with Lorain Girl Scout Troop 50395, a multi-level troop of girls from Kindergarten through Eighth Grade. The girls are working on their Butterfly Badge and will soon be helping us oversee our Bonaminio Pollinator garden located near Lorain City Hall. We met with the girls at their 10/21/24 troop meeting to address the topic of Monarchs, pollinators, and the importance of pollinator gardens. The girls are busy learning about butterflies and other pollinators and are excited to help us with the overseeding when the weather permits. We are hoping for the first week in December as temperatures should be consistently cool enough by then.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

We worked with Ohio Prairie Nursery and OpenSeed to learn the best eco-friendly treatment for weeds within our gardens. Our City Storm Water Engineer is actively working to ensure the safety of our stormwater runoff. The Engineers have created a Heron Rookery and cleaned up the area along the Black River through several years worth of efforts to rid the area of waste and rubbish and to decrease the release of commercial chemical waste. The efforts have paid off, and the bank of the Black River is currently home to herons and a host of other birds. The (healthy) fish and game population in and near the river has also increased exponentially.

We've instituted the new chemical treatments and it will be "in progress" for the life of our gardens. We haven't eliminated the use of harsher chemicals in other green spaces and parks in the city, but that is something we are working toward.
