## Pledge Summary

Rochester, MN is a growing city in the north central part of the United States. We are a town of approximately 120,000 and the third largest city in Minnesota. We do have strategies in our Sustainability & Resiliency Plan that align with some of the action items suggested and our Sustainability Coordinator is excited to assist in this area. Many of the action items are already in the works under the guidance of our Environmental Education Specialist and City Parks Department Forester, too. We are all excited about continuing to make improvements that will support the Monarch!

## Action Items Committed for 2022

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

### Systems Change

- Remove milkweed from the list of noxious plants in city weed / landscaping ordinances (if applicable).
- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

We plan to revise the TGW ordinance this winter. -we have not at this time The City of Rochester Parks and Recreation Department promoted a "No Mow May" program in May 2022 by suspending enforcement of the tall grass and noxious weeds ordinance for the month of May to support flowers that bloom early and support pollinators. The City printed over 500 signs for the program. Info here:

There is already a permit that allows for natural landscape plantings that may get confused with tall grass.

We added the native plant garden for pollinators at the City's Water Reclamation Plant. Additionally we conducted maintenance on rain gardens in city parks in partnership with City departments of Parks & Rec, Public Works, and Administration, as well as the Master Gardeners of Olmsted County.

Non woody invasives/noxious weeds are covered under the Tall Grass and Noxious Weeds ordinance. There are several volunteer groups that have been working on invasive species removal of buckthorn and garlic mustard in some local and regional city parks.
