Pledge Summary

The City of Dana Point is a beachside community in southern California that is home to over 30,000 residents. Dana Point is named after author/adventurer Richard Henry Dana Jr. who described the area as the "only romantic spot on the coast" in his book *Two Years Before the Mast*. Dana Point has long been a stop over for the western Monarch Butterfly during their migration, so much so that one of our coastal communities is called Monarch Beach. The City has committed to creating Monarch habitat throughout the community to ensure that Monarch butterflies continue to have a place to rest, relax or call home in Dana Point.

Public participation is a driver for the program. Communities have come together to give their time and effort to build beautiful habitat space. Future resources on equitable engagement would be useful. The program currently has great resources for creating usable habitat space.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The program hit record highs in volunteer numbers (over 250 participants), and has sustained strong participation since. Many residents have now planted their own pollinator gardens in their backyards, based on the program's plants. The program also saw habitats come closer to completion and a new habitat become scheduled for 2024.

Many departments support the program. At least four departments played a role in program development.

The city departments collaborated together to carry out a variety of roles. These include placing signage, determining new habitat locations, irrigation, materials procurement, and other administrative services. For Earth Day, 2 city departments did an event together to promote the program and increased public engagement.

At the event, the students collected data on monarch butterfly's, caterpillars, and chrysalis numbers. They used a pre-made data sheet to record how many monarch butterflies were in each life cycle stage. The habitat was divided into sections to avoid double counting. The result yielded approximately 60 caterpillar sightings.

Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

What is the total acreage of land treated to remove invasive plants?

0.77 acres (approximately 33,000 sq ft total)

At each habitat build, volunteers remove invasive plants and weeds. No pesticides/herbicides are used. Volunteers are trained to hand remove plants using tools. They are also shown how to properly dispose of the removed materials.

Each habitat site has a Monarch Waystation designation sign. At Sea Terrace Park, there is an educational panel displayed that covers the monarch butterfly life cycle and facts. At Sea Canyon Park, a Xerces pollinator habitat designation sign is posted, as that habitat site received the plant kit grant.
