Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

a. The Parks, Recreation, and Tourism department is currently in the beginning stages of the Parks Master planning process now, which may incorporate more complete plans for Monarch and pollinator conservation efforts. b. There were a series of plantings at the newly established Unity Park that provide new pollinator habitat along the river bench and in bioswales within the parking area. c. Greenville's new comprehensive plan, GVL2040, was adopted in the Spring of 2021. The plan includes ambitious goals for open space acquisition and preservation. Where appropriate, some of these open space areas may be preserved as natural areas or include gardens with habitat for pollinator species. d. The Parks & Grounds Division is currently pursuing a design and hope to begin implementation of two Monarch Waystations in Cleveland Park. We are hopeful that this initiative will be the first of great things to come. e. The Greenville City Zoo intends to design and begin educational programming at their small pollinator garden. There is no estimated start date for that to begin.
