Pledge Summary

Situated in the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains, Greenville is the major metropolitan area of the Upstate region of South Carolina with a population of over 70,000. Greenville's reinvigorated downtown serves as the focal point, contributing significantly to the city's rising reputation as one of the best places to live in the United States. The city features more than 400 acres of parkland, including Unity Park, Greenville's newest park featuring state-of-the-art playgrounds, expansive green spaces, pedestrian bridges and walking trails and Falls Park on the Reedy River, featuring impressive natural waterfalls, gardens, nature trails and the Liberty Bridge, a striking pedestrian suspension bridge. Adding to the city's distinctive charm is the Swamp Rabbit Trail, 22-miles of multi-use greenway that traverses along the Reedy River. The City of Greenville takes great pride in its parks and recreation system and the natural environment. Providing habitat for pollinators including Monarch butterflies is important to support the natural ecosystem, public and private gardens, and overall environment. The City of Greenville is committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge.

What is the total acreage of land treated to remove invasive plants?

Unknown acreage. Non-Native Invasive species removal and plantings of pollinators happens often and is difficult to calculate.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

A total of 1626 employee hours and approximately 350-400 volunteer hours were utilized in efforts to remove invasive species removal from in the City of Greenville Parks. The majority of these invasive removals were completed by hand in order to be selective and leave native plants and trees in an effort to allow them to thrive. Approximately 1651 pollinator plants have been planted in and around the City to provide habitats for butterflies and other pollinators.

It is the City of Greenville's plan to preserve as much as 35% of remaining vacant land by 2040 to protect Greenville's quality of Life and the environment. From this plan, the preservation and growth of native environmental habitats is a top priority. These preserved areas are to be utilized to improve air and water quality, protect wildlife habitats, and create viewsheds, improve groundwater retention, increase tree canopy, and help prevent flooding. The Parks and Grounds Division is then to take these areas and improve the environmental habitat as seen fit. The Cleveland Park Pollinator Garden was one of the steps taken to specifically provide an habitat for pollinators central to the City and within the City's largest park.
