## Pledge Summary

The City of Sandy Springs is the second largest city in metro Atlanta with a vibrant a population of approximately 110,000. Enjoying twenty-two miles of shoreline along the Chattahoochee River, two local forest preserves and hundreds of acres of the Chattahoochee River National Recreation Area, environmental stewardship is a natural priority for Sandy Springs. We became a Bee City USA Affiliate in 2021, and by signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge, we strengthen our commitment to improving pollinator habitat in our parks and engaging the community in efforts to saving the monarch butterfly and native wildlife in general.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

Lead by the Urban Forest Coordinator, a workgroup comprised of residents and experts revised the Recommended Tree Species List from the Technical Manual. This list aids in the selection of tree species for private and public development. Information about the wildlife value for native species was added, giving them a score (Supported Wildlife Score) based on the number of pollinator and bird species supported. Staff provided drafts that were reviewed and improved by the workgroup. The amendment was approved by Mayor and City Council and incorporated in the Technical Manual.

It is one of the most popular City parks for walking trails and family activities. 7300 Brandon Mill Rd NW, Sandy Springs, GA 30328 An eroding slope in the parking lot visible to anyone coming into the park was transformed into a wildflower patch. Garden for Wildlife and the Georgia Association of Conservation Districts provided seeds and plants.
