Pledge Summary

The Village of Ridgfield Park, settled in 1685, is a residential urban-suburban community located in southeast Bergen County, New Jersey, and proudly boasts one of the longest continuous Fourth of July parades in the USA. It was first established in 1894. Like this grand country, Ridgfield Park is a rich source of good old American history. Our Public Library is a great place to learn more about us. Of 565 municipalities statewide, Ridgfield Park is one of only four with a village type of government in New Jersey operating a Walsh Act (city commission) form of government. Mayor John Anlian of Ridgfield Park, NJ is committed to saving the monarch butterfly by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and he looks forward to engaging residents into building more monarch friendly gardens throughout the town.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Host or support a monarch neighborhood challenge to engage neighborhoods and homeowners' associations within the community to increase awareness, support community unity around a common mission, and/or create habitat for the monarch butterfly.

Educated people to the plight of the monarch and other pollinators and asked that they plant native. Handed out many packets of seeds as well as making many available for community members to take at will. Hundreds of seed packets were taken, hopefully we will see more pollinator plants in town in 2023. Gianna Terrarosa and Nicole Kachadoorian oversaw and coordinated the challenge with support from Sustainable Ridgefield Park Chair and the Municipal Commissioner who oversees that aforementioned committee. This commissioner reported back to the overall Board of Commissioner on the plantings in municipal spaces. Some social media was used to keep the community informed of the different locations where the plantings took place.

Gianna Terrarosa initially requested that the Mayor and Commissioners take the pledge at a public meeting and then wrote to Mark Olson, Commissioner of Community Gardens to ask the gardeners to participate. The gardeners including Mark and Leslie Olson planted four gardens in park locations, at the municipal building and the Department of Public Works. Gianna took plants from her original pollinator garden and planted them in one of the new gardens.

The high school administration permitted the planting of the first garden on high school property by Girl Scout Gianna Terrarosa for her "Just One Plant" Gold Award and allowed for education to be done onsite. Our local hardware store provided some plants for the garden and our local print shop created a sign to promote the garden. Community members helped with the framing and planting the plants in the garden. The Environmental commission supported the creation of said garden and one member became the Gianna's expert mentor for the project. They also invited Gianna to have a table at our Earth Day where people were educated to the plight of the monarch as well as given native seeds to plant to help the monarch and all pollinators. The DPW assisted with digging out the area and providing and laying natural mulch in the garden. The Ridgefield Park Public Library was awarded the grant that provided all the seeds for the giveaway and allowed Gianna to do programming for children, teens and adults. Members of the Green Team and Community Gardeners created the additional gardens in town. The Mayor and Commissioners supported the project and created the proclamation and read it at our Earth Day Celebration. Businesses outside of town but still very local donated soil, plants, building materials, signage, and educational materials.
