## Pledge Summary

The Village of Ridgely Park has a population of 13,000+ residents. The Hackensack River touches our borders. On June 3, 2023 local officials, members from the Bergen County Board of Commissioners and residents of the Village celebrated the unveiling and grand opening of the Nature Preserve which is the culmination of 50 years of planning. The space is constructed with an ADA interpretive trail and boardwalk throughout. Increasing interest in the space along with nature walks regularly offered by the Environmental Commission has shown that our residents wish to expand their knowledge in sustainable plantings they can do for monarch and pollinator conservation.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

**What program was launched or maintained to complete this effort? If you are involved with another National Wildlife Federation program, please mention that below. (Please include a link to the program, if possible)**

With the grand opening of the Nature Preserve regular informative talks and walks occur at that location educating visitors about the advantage of planting native species in municipal locations and in residential spaces. A particular event that took place was on Saturday May 6, 2023 the Ridgefield Park Nature Preserve held a spring planning event. Members of the Department of Public Works, along with over 25 Volunteers (interested citizens, student members of the Key Club, and others) planted a variety of native trees and plants in the preserve. The main focus of this event was to work on the loop, at the E. Grand Ave entrance. There was also work done in the Southern Planting bed at the start of Warrington Meadow. Species included Seaside Goldenrod, Foxglove Beard Tongue, and Bee Balm in the upper planting bed. These plants are known as pollinators, which attract Bees and Butterflies to feed on, then to distribute pollen for surrounding plants. At the entrance loop, trees from Red Maple, White Ash, Tupelo, and Persimmon were added. Small plants like Northern Bay Berry, Virginia Sweetspire, Groundel Bush and Spice Bush were also planted. Not only were plants selected because of their native origins, but they will act a deer repellent and to hold the ground soil stable in raining conditions. Volunteers were shown the preferred way of transplanting the plants to insure the maximum chance for survival by Landscape Architect Mr. Richard Pillar. The Volunteers were moved into groups, given gloves and tools, before walking to the areas that needed to be worked on. Plants in the entrance loop were moved to their place earlier in the morning. It was then left to the Volunteers to dig the appropriate hole for each species, gently removed them for their container, and securely place the plant into the ground.

It included but was not limited to planting native trees and shrubs, removing invasive plants, monitoring trails, tracking wildlife, coordinating volunteers, and leading nature walks throughout the summer months (June through mid-August). In addition she did preliminary work on developing educational material which provided the basis for newsletter and social media material. A clean up was scheduled for October but was canceled due to weather and the next clean up(s) will be held on December 2nd (weather permitting)
