Mayor Christopher Lund of Edgerton, Wisconsin has committed to save the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with his signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge on March 9, 2022! Chris looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the city and will work to provide education opportunities so Edgerton residents can learn more about our monarch friends and how they too can help!

Public Communications started with putting in place a NEW program (a monarch station) at our public library which was hugely successful. Via that new program communication was continual. Public communication included printed material (located at the monarch station at the public library), social media (Gifts For Kids FB Page & Edgerton Library FB Page) & printed media (Edgerton Reporter). A total of 3 different monarch related articles were published in the Edgerton Reporter. Via the monarch station we also hosted 2 in person monarch presentation for anyone (adults & children) interested in learning more about our monarch friends and how they too could help. Via this pledge I hand raised a total of 183 monarchs. 36 were raised via the monarch station / Edgerton Library, 93 were adopted out to interested Edgerton Residents & (in early September) 14 were adopted out to Local Teachers to be raised in their classrooms.

How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?

At the in-person monarch program & monarch station 100 Ziploc bags of 10 FREE milkweed seeds were given away. Between the end of May and the end of August 78 FREE milkweed seedling pots & 51 packets of seeds were distributed via Lori's home at 346 Fairway Circle plus seedling pots provided to Silverwood Park for their new pollinator garden they planted during their summer school camp.
