With the seeds we gave away many went to residents in the community, we replanted at all 7 of our fire stations, we planted full beds of wildflowers at our Community Garden. We shared seeds with the Rotary Community Garden, they are also growing milkweed at their space. We have all native beds at our Farmers Market.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

Our garden space is located in a historically Black neighborhood. We have provided a garden space for them and have many volunteers and education events in the space over the past year. We also provide free environmental programming in all public/private/charter schools in our county. Our topics vary but we do a bee/butterfly specific program and always reach title 1 schools through our outreach. Also, the Rotary Community Garden, that we partner with, gives a portion of their produce to local organizations to give to those in need.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

It seemed like a natural fit because we are also a Bee City and Tree City. We want to continue to support and educate on all pollinators.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to

help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

By taking the Mayors Monarch Pledge this year we received a grant from the National Wildlife Federation and received 400 seedlings. Without your connection, we never would have known about this.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We continue to focus on native plantings and educate as many people as we can through our outreach.
