## Pledge Summary

The City of Missoula is committed to stewarding its natural resources and supporting pollinator conservation. Missoula's Parks and Recreation Department manages thousands of acres of parks, trails, and open space. This Monarch Pledge supports ongoing efforts to incorporate conservation, education, and restoration into Missoula's Parks.

## Action Items Committed for 2024

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

### Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.

Through efforts at City-maintained community garden plots, by working to improve native habitat and natural values at neighborhood parks to bring access to nature closer to home, and by providing free programs to the community with an aim of reducing barriers to engagement with City Conservation Lands.

We are working to provide low-barrier programs across the City. Our habitat stewardship volunteer days are free and open to all.

Working with the AmeriCorps Member is a great resource, helping to increase capacity and spread messaging.

The City of Missoula continues to look for new ways to increase habitat value across all green-space, and aims to continually expand ecological restoration efforts and native plant species landscaping in developed settings.

Both departments within the City of Missoula worked to expand specifications for pollinator-friendly native forbs, reduced mowing areas, and reduced turf grass areas in new projects. Projects included Cattail Corner Stormwater Wetland, Takima-Kokaski Park, and projects across the Conservation Lands System.

The City of Missoula Conservation Lands Program utilizes an Integrated Pest Management approach to their invasive species removal program. This program covers invasive species management across 4,700+ acres of Conservation Lands surrounding the City of Missoula.

City of Missoula Parks & Recreation is working to update development code and review processes to ensure a greater variety of native plant materials are allowed for and incorporated into City code documentation.

**How many plants were planted?**

300

**Please describe your effort in completing this action.**

Three primary areas were targeted for additional wildlife and pollinator habitat: at Community Gardens operated by Garden City Harvest, along developed park trailways, and on Conservation Lands restoration sites. 3 acres of new habitat were seeded with native grasses and forbs along a new packed gravel trail in Bellevue Park, and area which had previously been maintained for turfgrass. Adding native plant structure and plant diversity provides valuable pollinator habitat in the heart of Missoula.
