## Pledge Summary

Mount Kisco, located in Westchester, NY, is a vibrant community filled with green spaces, quaint neighborhoods, and a walkable downtown. Although just three square miles, it is a premier destination for dining, shopping, entertainment and award winning medical care. Lead by our Conservation Advisory Council, Mount Kisco is a part of Healthy Yards' Pollinator Pathways project that encourages pollinator friendly native plantings. Our community is committed to enhancing and maintaining a natural environment that supports Monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Launch or maintain an outdoor education program(s) (e.g., at schools, after-school programs, community centers and groups) that builds awareness and creates habitat by engaging students, educators, and the community in planting native milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Schoolyard Habitats program and Monarch Mission curriculum).

- Host or support a monarch neighborhood challenge to engage neighborhoods and homeowners' associations within the community to increase awareness, support community unity around a common mission, and/or create habitat for the monarch butterfly.

- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

We have used a variety of communication methods: Info Table and Seed Giveaway at our local Farmers Market, Info Table, seed give-away and speakers at our annual Earth Day celebration, Kids Tree Art exhibit with prizes and Seed/sapling give-away at our Annual Arbor Day Celebration, A hands-on Native Plant Workshop, using our Instagram account (personal and org) to promote pollinator awareness in general and Monarchs specifically. Flyers and other communications were in both English and Spanish, and we actively sought the participation of minority communities in our community through outreach to Neighbors Link and The Boys and Girls Club.

In addition to our Earth Day Celebration and Farmers Market seed give-aways, we participated in Northern Westchester Pollinator Pathways meetings and shared our experiences with several garden groups, as well as with the Marsh Sanctuary. We also held Native Plant Workshop where local experts shared their expertise with local gardeners.

We helped NYSACC organize a Statewide meeting of Conservation Groups with over 100 attendees. We held meetings with Village Management, DPW, and other stakeholder, and engaged in a discussion which resulted in a one month extension of wildflower mowing in Leonard Park (until after southward Monarch migration was complete), as well as a plan to improve the fencing and educational signage at our Flewellyn Pollinator Garden

A kids Tree Art event and exhibition where approx 80 kids from around town drew, sculpted, wrote, or played art that expressed their feelings about trees, pollinators, and the environment. The second was our 6th annual Photo Exhibition, with more than 75 photos were submitted in the Nature Category, many of Monarch, other butterflies, bees, birds and other pollinators.
