Pledge Summary

Charged with providing park and recreation services for approximately 55,000 residents, the Crystal Lake Park District system includes 42 parks spanning over 1,400 acres and program offerings of over 1,000 annually. Facilities include the Nature Center, Main and West Beaches, Colonel Palmer House, Lippold Family Golf Center, Boncosky Softball Complex at Lippold Park, Grand Oaks Recreation/Active Adult Center, the Racket Club, Barlina House Preschool, and numerous picnic shelters. In addition to parks, facilities and programs, the district maintains miles of bike and hiking trails enjoyed by many throughout the year. It is the mission of the Crystal Lake Park District to enrich all lives through Recreation, Parks and Nature.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

The Crystal Lake Park District has a long history of working to provide habitat for monarchs and other native species. Joining the Mayors' Monarch Pledge was a natural extension as a means of getting the word out to the community about the importance of our efforts.

At this time we have been able to accomplish all of our goals with the current resources provided by the NWF.

In the past, the Crystal Lake Park District has worked to provide monarch habitat through high quality natural areas. The Mayors' Monarch Pledge has helped us draw increased attention to these areas. It has also provided motivation to increase the number of smaller plantings which are beneficial to monarchs and other native pollinator species.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

The Crystal Lake Park District has a robust natural area volunteer program with at least 7 workdays per month. These volunteers spend most of their time removing invasive species from two dedicated Illinois Nature Preserves. During 2022 calendar year more than 500 hours of volunteer labor has been provided in our invasive species control efforts in these two properties. While methods of control depend on species, a combination of physical (cutting or pulling) and chemical controls have been used.
