## Pledge Summary

Charged with providing park and recreation services for approximately 55,000 residents, the Crystal Lake Park District system includes 42 parks spanning over 1,400 acres and program offerings of over 1,000 annually. Facilities include the Nature Center, Main and West Beaches, Colonel Palmer House, Lippold Family Golf Center, Boncosky Softball Complex at Lippold Park, Grand Oaks Recreation/Active Adult Center, the Racket Club, Barlina House Preschool, and numerous picnic shelters. In addition to parks, facilities and programs, the district maintains miles of bike and hiking trails enjoyed by many throughout the year.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

In the past year, our monarch butterfly conservation efforts have stood out for their dual focus on enhancing existing high-quality natural areas and expanding smaller plantings. The Crystal Lake Park District has long been committed to offering native habitats through well-maintained natural spaces. The Mayors' Monarch Pledge has been crucial in raising awareness of these areas, highlighting their importance in monarch conservation.

The event was a month long pollinator bio blitz conducted during the month of September in conjunction with the National Recreation and Park Association's Parks for Pollinators initiative. During the month of September, visitors to the Nature Center were asked to use "iNaturalist" to document pollinators found on Crystal Lake Park District properties. Over 2,000 visitors were reached.

Approximately 1,000 packets of pollinator friendly native seed packets were given away.

The Crystal Lake Park District installed over 1,000 milkweed and other native nectar producing plants in a new demonstration garden at the Nature Center.

The Crystal Lake Rotary Club Dawnbreakers and local Girl Scouts helped plant the plants.

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

The Crystal Lake Park District has built and maintained a comprehensive and effective natural area volunteer program, hosting at least seven workdays per month. These dedicated volunteers focus primarily on removing invasive species from two designated Illinois Nature Preserves. In 2023, our volunteers contributed over 300 hours of labor to control invasive species across various park district natural areas. Our invasive species removal programs are regularly assessed and adapted to address the unique challenges posed by different species. We employ a combination of mechanical and chemical control methods, depending on the specific invasive species. Mechanical techniques, such as cutting, prescribed fire, and hand-pulling, are used based on the characteristics of each plant, while chemical controls are applied strategically where needed. This flexible and responsive approach reflects our commitment to preserving the ecological integrity of our natural areas through proactive and adaptive management.

We have engaged residents of Crystal Lake and surrounding communities through demonstration gardens, permanent exhibits, and educational programs. These efforts are designed to highlight the value of supporting native pollinators and to encourage local action in creating and preserving pollinator-friendly habitats.

The Crystal Lake Park District Nature Center offers field trips for CUSD 47 and several private preschools, with a focus on insects and other pollinator species. We also provide programs for Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, and Scouts BSA, which include valuable information about pollinators and their crucial role in the environment. In addition to these educational opportunities, the Nature Center features permanent displays that emphasize the importance of protecting and providing habitats for monarchs and other pollinator species.
