Pledge Summary

The Village of Lake in the Hills, Illinois is located in the far northwest suburbs of Chicago with a population of 28,982. Since 1952, Lake in the Hills has provided a high quality of life for its residents and businesses. The community is home to 34 parks, with the largest natural resource being the 240-acre Fen at Barbara Key Park. The Village's recreational programs focus on utilizing outdoor spaces to bring the community together throughout the year. Aligning with the Village's dedication to the preservation of our natural areas, Village President Ray Bogdanowski has demonstrated his commitment to creating or preserving pollinator habitats and educating citizens about how they can make a difference. With his signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge, he encourages Village residents and staff to take steps to increase the planting of milkweed and nectar plants to preserve and strengthen the monarch butterfly population.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. Pollinator Garden at Sunset Park

Sunset Park is free to visit and accessible to all (both financially and physically). The pollinator garden is located on the southeast end of the park, near the playground. This placement was intentional so as to increase the exposure and visibility for park visitors.

In February 2022, President Bogdanowski joined the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to help save the monarch butterfly. Our community is committed to creating habitats for pollinators and educating residents about how they can support the monarch butterfly and other pollinators as they play a vital role in our ecosystem.

In 2021, the Rotary Club of Lake in the Hills joined Operation Pollination, which recognizes the importance of restoring and maintaining pollinator habitat on public and private lands. The Rotary Club planted its inaugural pollinator garden in Algonquin in May 2021. The

Land Conservancy of McHenry County partners with the residents in and around McHenry County to preserve natural, scenic and agricultural land for the benefit and health of the whole community. Sarah Michehl, Community Engagement Specialist with The Land Conservancy of McHenry County, participated in the pollinator garden installation.
