Pledge Summary

Located North of Grapevine Lake in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metropolitan Area with a population of 80,000; The Town of Flower Mound is committed to preserving the unique country atmosphere and heritage that makes Flower Mound one of the best places to live, work, and play. Through the Mayors' Monarch Pledge, the Town endeavors to further engage in the conservation of vital pollinator habitat and looks forward to a growing community effort to save the monarch butterfly.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

This year the Town partnered with the Elm Fork Chapter of the Texas Master Naturalists to establish an on-going opportunity for Master Naturalists to help maintain the Monarch Waystation at Town Hall. The Town also continued to support a group of Master Naturalists and Master Gardeners with a monarch garden and native habitat restoration at a local park. Additionally, the Town's Environmental Programs coordinator presented on Establishing Pollinator Habitat with Local Government at a meeting of the Trinity Forks chapter of the Native Plant Society.

Interpretive signage is located at Blueblossom preserve (park), at the new pollinator gardens in the arboretum, and additional educational signs are located at Town Hall and Green Acres park.

The Town gave out 124 3-gallon native trees for TX Arbor Day, and 290 native tree and plant seedlings at events.

Two of the giveaway events were held in conjunction with Keep Flower Mound Beautiful events, and another was alongside an event held at the Town's library. Others were standalone.
