## Pledge Summary

City of Grapevine, TX is in the heart of the Dallas and Fort Worth Metroplex with a population of just over 54,000. Known for its hometown feel, and renowned festivals and events, residents and visitors enjoy over 1,600 acres of parkland, 23 trails and more than 9 miles of shoreline along Grapevine Lake. Mayor William D. Tate is committed to reversing the decline of the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and continues to engage with the people of Grapevine in providing more habitat for these magnificent creatures.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.

### Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.

Three. Keep Grapevine Beautiful, GoWild, and Grapevine Garden Club (mentioned previously)

The City has been a long and supporting partner of Keep Grapevine Beautiful which is a nonprofit organization preserving our environment through education efforts and engaging volunteer activities. The City provides staffing and administrative support to KGVB and co-hosts many educational events. KGVB promotes monarch butterfly conservation through educational social media posts, lecture series, and events such as the Parks for Pollinators BioBlitz. The GoWild is an environmental outdoor outreach program administered by the Parks and Recreation Department. The GoWild classes focused on pollinators and the monarch butterfly during the months of September thru November.

Met with Parks Manager in November 2021 to identify areas in public rights-of-ways and on parklands that could be reduced to once a year mowing, areas where mowing could be reduced to after spring wildflowers have gone to seed and no-mow areas. The revised map will be available in January 2022 as will the adjusted mowing schedule. Both documents will be part of the Parks Maintenance Plan. Meet with the contracted ground management service provider occasionally throughout the year to confirm and designate no-mow areas.

**Please describe your effort in completing this action.**

The City of Grapevine in partnership with Keep Grapevine Beautiful planted 89 milkweed plants at Parr Park Pollinator Prairie in June 2021. The milkweed plants were provided by the Monarch Watch program. The Grapevine Botanical Garden also has milkweed plants and nectar-producing plants throughout the garden.

Such events include Butterfly Flutterby and the annual Plant Sale. The GGC utilizes its website, newsletter, and lecture series to promote pollinator-supporting plants.

The City of Grapevine has 40 plus acres of public rights-of-ways that have been landscaped with native and adaptive plants and wildflowers that are pollinator-friendly beginning in 2015. The most recent project, Dallas Road Transportation Oriented Development Corridor/Cotton Belt Trail Extension Project was completed in September 2021. These six projects have been supported through the use of TxDOT's Green Ribbon and Governor Community Achievement Award grant funding programs as well as the North Central Council of Governments Transportation Alternative Set-Aside funding program.
