City of Grapevine, TX is in the heart of the Dallas and Fort Worth Metroplex with a population of just over 54,000. Known for its hometown feel, and renowned festivals and events, residents and visitors enjoy over 1,600 acres of parkland, 23 trails, and more than 9 miles of shoreline along Grapevine Lake. Mayor William D. Tate is committed to reversing the decline of the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and continues to engage with the people of Grapevine in providing more habitat for these magnificent creatures.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

The annual Butterfly Flutterby event is free to all attendees. Participants receive education about monarchs and their role in the ecosystem and the seriousness of their dwindling numbers. The 2024 event marked 28 years, taking place in the Botanical Gardens which are centrally located within the city. This park is ADA accessible and open to all visitors at no charge throughout the year. The event took place from 10:00 am – 2:00 pm.
