## Pledge Summary

The City of Gahanna is a suburb of Columbus, Ohio with a population of 35,000 residents. Although we are in an urban setting, we manage over 750 acres of parkland and natural areas. We aim to improve pollinator and monarch habitat by installing pollinator gardens, planting milkweed, and adding more prairies throughout the city.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

### Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.

Many of our educational programming is geared towards our lower income neighborhood elementary schools and to our local seniors.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The city of Gahanna has a goal to be a more sustainable, green community. Creating more monarch habitats helps us achieve that goal.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

We utilized our arboretum for educational programming. We partnered with Green Columbus to give away free tree saplings to the community. We partnered with NWF to help provide native pollinator habitat signage around our prairies and other habitats. Other resources that may be helpful would be to expand our trails and provide paved trails. We also aim to add observation areas to some trails to allow visitors to enjoy our parks and wildlife in a low impact manner.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

We are working with residents to allow wildflower meadows in residential yards in accordance with our city code. We aim to use pollinator friendly or native plants in our planters and park landscape beds. We are still working to remove milkweed from the city code's list of noxious plants. We are in the preliminary stages of setting up a burn program to better manage our prairies.

Parks worked with streets and service to revise mowing plans in select roadsides and rights-of-way to accommodate new prairies and pollinator habitats. Mifflin fire is helping develop a prairie burn plan which will make managing prairies much more efficient.

We remove invasive trees from parks and streets when able. We also mow down and treat honeysuckle and other invasive species such as poison hemlock from prairie land and other parkland. The methods used to eradicate invasive species range from mechanically removal to using chemicals to kill the plant.
