Pledge Summary

The City of Gahanna is a suburb of Columbus, Ohio with a population of 35,000 residents. Although we are in an urban setting, we manage over 750 acres of parkland and natural areas. We aim to improve pollinator and monarch habitat by installing pollinator gardens, planting milkweed, and adding more prairies throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Systems Change

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.

the City of Gahanna as a whole has a goal of becoming a more sustainable, pollinator friendly, and greener community.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We used our arboretum for educational nature programming. We continued to add native pollinator habitat signs at our new prairies and pollinator gardens. We use a lot of the Monarch pledge tip sheets to hand out to residents if they ask for guidance when creating their own pollinator gardens. Some resources that would be helpful would be to expand our

current trails and pave existing trails to make them more accessible. We are also aiming to add more observation areas to existing trails. I think some examples of programming we can put on would be helpful to continue to reach new people.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We continue to use native and pollinator friendly plants in our planters and park landscape beds. We aim to reduce pesticide use by using various pest management methods. We continue to work towards implementing a prescribed fire program to better manage our prairies.

We worked with volunteers from our local school's Kiwanis club to install 2 new wildflower and native plant areas in 2 of our parks. We also worked with volunteers from 2 local organizations to plant native perennials and annuals in landscape beds and planters. Lastly, we had a group of volunteers from a local school come and remove invasive species in several of our parks.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

We have tried to be more aggressive when treating for invasives. Before mowing prairies, we walk each site and manually remove any woody invasives and apply a cut stump

treatment to the stump. We are also developing a new plan for treatment and removal of tree of heaven by treating the tree with an herbicide before removal of the tree in an attempt to prevent suckers from emerging from the cut stump.

We have begun the process of working with our economic development department to try to incentivize local businesses that do not prioritize beautification of their greenspaces. It was noted that some businesses do not utilize their greenspaces, not only does that reduce the green aesthetics of the area, but those spaces could also be habitat for pollinators. By creating an incentive to beautify those spaces, we hope to add more habitat for pollinators.
