Pledge Summary

Cheltenham Township is a first-ring suburb of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, with a population of close to 38,000. Its 9-square-mile community boasts 23 parks and open spaces for residents and visitors to enjoy. Cheltenham Township adopted a Sustainability Plan in 2013, one of the goals of which is Ecological Stewardship. Cheltenham is taking the Monarch Pledge for the fourth year in 2025 to include cultivating the existing and adding more monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration gardens, continuing public communication efforts to encourage citizens to plant monarch gardens at their homes or neighborhoods, hosting a Monarch Butterfly Festival, and reviewing Township ordinances, regulations and practices. The Township's efforts are collaborative by the partnership of community organizations and resident volunteers, including through the Cheltenham Township Library System, the Township's Environmental Advisory Council, and parks Friends.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Host or support a monarch butterfly festival that is accessible to all residents in the community and promotes monarch and pollinator conservation, as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.

Our community continually strives to meet the goals and spirit of our 2013 Sustainability Plan, and our residents have been expressing an interest in personal commitment to the goals of the Monarch Pledge as well.

This year, we weren’t in a position to take advantage of more resources, because we were missing the most precious one - staff. Grants for community programs would always be a valuable resource.

Our community lost some key staff this year, so our progress on the pledge items faltered a bit, but we are still committed to continuing to pursue these valuable goals.

The Township continued to share pollinator-supporting information on social media, including sharing in post or story information from PA's Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. We posted monthly resources and information to the "Pollinator Corner" on our website. There were no explicitly monarch-focused stories in this year's print publications, but we did include an article on responsible mosquito management - tips rather than using pesticides that also kill butterflies.

Please describe the details of your monarch butterfly festival and how you ensured the event was accessible by all residents in the community (e.g., events, length, notable successes, outreach, location).

This was our second annual two-hour Monarch Festival and it was wonderfully attended! Arts and crafts drew the younger crowd, while partner organizations shared with parents the importance of creating habitat for monarchs and other pollinators. Some of our partners gave away milkweed and other seedlings and saplings. The Library presented a pollinator-related StoryWalk and did story time with a few pollinator/monarch books during the event. The event also included a butterfly release. Attendees were able to see the progress of the Township's pollinator garden at this location, which was planted just before our first annual Monarch Festival last year. The event was publicized through the Township's digital channels, vocalized at public meetings, mentioned in its print calendar mailed to every home, shared through the libraries, through Parks Friends group e-communications, and posted on the announcement board at Grove Park, the event location.

The Township continues to maintain its pollinator gardens at the Township Administration Building at at Grove Park.

Cheltenham's Parks Superintendent plans and maintains the garden, and sometimes consults members of local parks friends groups and our environmental advisory council with experience in pollinator gardens.

Two events - one was a giveaway at our Monarch Festival (photo); our EAC members and residents from the group Residents for a Sustainable Cheltenham were at the helm of donating and distributing the seeds. The Township also supported (via promotion) the Friends of High School Park, who hosted their annual plant sale in conjunction with their Arts in the Park event in June.

Township staff has been working with members of the Environmental Advisory Council on multiple drafts of an amended nuisance ordinance to be far more accepting of naturalized yards.

We had hoped to complete this during 2025, but will strive now to complete it in 2026. EAC members continue to provide valuable feedback, but around the time this was brought to the Board (see attached minutes), we lost a key staff member and the position has not yet been filled, so the Director has not been able to continue adjustments to this ordinance yet.

While staffing shortages didn't allow that to come to fruition this year, existing milkweed/nectar-producing gardens have been maintained in High School Park and in public space in the Glenside neighborhood including Grove Park.
