Action Items Committed for 2022

~2,500 ft

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

We tackled an area of highly invasive and destructive hybrid knotweed from Alimagnet Park. We chemically sprayed and are currently smothering with a thick geotextile meant to eradicate terrible invasive plants. Follow up will occur in spring to ensure no runners or shoots escape.
