Action Items Committed for 2023

The City of Apple Valley will offer financial assistance to landowners interested in installing water quality project improvement projects: raingardens, shoreline buffers, and native gardens. The goal of the program is to empower landowners to make positive impacts to the quality and quantity of water resources—lakes, ponds, and wetlands—in the community. As an added benefit, native plants utilized in water quality improvement help our local pollinators and improve habitat biodiversity. Projects may receive 50% the cost of the water quality improvement component of their project, not to exceed \$500 per lot or project. All funding is distributed on a first-come, first serve basis. Preference will be given to projects with a high impact to water quality (such as raingardens and shorelines) and for complete applications from first-come applicants.
