Pledge Summary

The Village of Wilmette is located in the North Shore suburbs of the city of Chicago. Wilmette has a population of roughly 28,000. The Village is located along Lake Michigan and is home to extensive urban forests and a large tree canopy. President Plunkett of Wilmette, IL has committed to saving monarch butterflies, preserving native pollinators, and making progress on a variety of Village sustainability initiatives. Village Trustees and staff look forward to engaging residents in upkeep and expanding our pollinator habitat throughout Wilmette.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. Program and Demonstration Gardens

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

In general, Wilmette is a rather affluent community with no defined lower-income areas. However, the Village is partnering with other communities sharing the I-94 corridor to install and maintain native habitats in the public rights-of-way.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The Village recognizes the importance of the Monarch butterfly and the significance of the decline of Monarch populations. The Village believes that human health ultimately depends on well-functioning ecosystems and that biodiverse regions can better support food

production, healthy soil and air quality and can foster health connections between humans and wildlife.

Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. The Village continually partakes in a "Leave the Leaves" campaign to encourage residents to avoid blowing or raking leaves from their flower beds. Additionally, the Village recently engaged in a gas-powered leaf blower working group to discuss and workshop ways to

further prohibit gas-powered leaf blowers. The Village also installed pollinator gardens on public property as a demonstration of what individual residents could do, and we promoted these gardens in our printed spring and summer newsletter, which get mailed to every resident. We also promote native garden tips in our weekly newsletter during the appropriate times of year, as well as on social media. Our Environmental and Energy Commission is launching a native habitats education campaign this year, which will include a dedicated page on the village website. We intend to purchase yard signs for residents to call attention to their native habitat gardens and to create a layer in GIS of homes that have the yard signs. The GIS layer will assist with coordinating walking tours and knowing which areas of the Village we need to focus educational campaign efforts.

Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

1200 Wilmette Ave and Elmwood Ave. The installations are at the Village Hall and the Elmwood Dunes Preserve. The Elmwood Dunes Preserve is a unique and rare ecosystem on the Lake Michigan Shoreline. It provides vital habitat for a variety of plants and animals.

What community organizations, groups, or leaders (if any) did you partner with or engage to complete this effort?

The original installation at the Village Hall was made possible in part by the Rotary Club of Wilmette Harbor. The original installation of the Elmwood Dunes Preserve was made possible by the Friends of Elmwood Dunes and the Rotary Club of Wilmette Harbor, along with several other private donations.

- Demonstration Garden at the SE corner of Hibbard Rd & Glenview Rd – maintenance performed by an outside contractor 3 times per year (spring, summer, fall). - Edens Pollinator Garden at Lake & Laramie – maintenance performed by an outside contractor 3 times per year (spring, summer, fall). A prescribed burn will potentially be completed in the fall of 2023. - Skokie Blvd Medians – maintenance performed by an outside contractor on a weekly basis.

Most of this progress was done in-house through plan creation.

The Village's Sustainability Plan specifically calls out increasing the availability and implementation of native species, limiting fertilizer use, and to continue work on the Mayors Monarch Pledge as well as Wildlife Habitat Certification. The Village's Comprehensive Plan is currently going through an update and the preliminary draft of that plan states "Increase the percentage of properties using sustainable landscaping, planting native species, and installing rain gardens." and "Expand and enhance pollinator habitats." The

Comprehensive Plan also states "Support implementation of the 2021 Adopted Sustainable Communities Strategic Plan" which, as previously mentioned, supports similar goals. The Comprehensive Plan is anticipated to be finished later this year.
