Pledge Summary

The Village of Wilmette is located in the North Shore suburbs of the City of Chicago. Wilmette has a population of roughly 28,000. The Village is located along Lake Michigan and is home to extensive urban forests and a large tree canopy. President Plunkett of Wilmette, IL has committed to saving monarch butterflies, preserving native pollinators, and making progress on a variety of Village sustainability initiatives. Village Trustees and staff look forward to engaging residents in upkeep and expanding our pollinator habitat throughout Wilmette.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

The majority of individuals reached would have been through the Village's e-news, which is a weekly subscription e-mail. There is no way to determine the age of the individuals, although most are assumed to be adults. It is estimated that about 300 children and 150 adults were reached through the Environmental and Energy Commissions seed giveaway. Additionally, approximately 100 individuals were reached through the Village's participation in Go Green Wilmette's "Sustainable Yard Tour" which was a tour of native landscapes in the Community.

The only new installation was a garden on the Northwest side of Village at 1200 Wilmette Ave. However, many plants are continually maintained and/or replaced at public works and park district properties.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

In general, Wilmette is a rather affluent community with no defined lower-income areas. However, the Village is continually partnering with other communities sharing the I-94 corridor to install and maintain native habitats in the public rights-of-way.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

The Village recognizes the importance of the Monarch butterfly and the significance of the decline of Monarch populations. The Village believes that human health ultimately depends on well-functioning ecosystems and that biodiverse regions can better support food production, healthy soil and air quality and can foster health connections between humans and wildlife.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Local volunteers have been the best resource thus far, many of whom are knowledgeable, helpful, and dedicated.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

In 2023, the Village contracted with Indigo Ecological Design to design the restoration of two prairie sites in the right-of-way at the intersection of Glenview and Long, scheduled for construction next year. The Village also supported a local Eagle Scout with the installation of a butterfly weed garden in the public right-of-way at the intersection of Iroquois & Pontiac. The Village provided guidance regarding the installation of the garden and shared the cost of the plants. The Eagle Scout plans to install some educational signage at a later date.

The Wilmette Environmental and Energy Commission (EEC) is currently in the process of developing native habitat yard signs for residential properties. The EEC is waiting to roll out the signs until 2024, due to the Village's website undergoing an update. The signs will include a QR code that links to additional native plant information and the website has to be complete for the signs to include the correct code. The EEC has had the signs designed and has created a criteria list for obtaining a sign. Upon completion of the new website, the EEC will have the signs printed and will make them available to residents.
