## Pledge Summary

The Village of Wilmette is located in the North Shore suburbs of the City of Chicago. Wilmette has a population of roughly 28,000. The Village is located along Lake Michigan and is home to extensive urban forests and a large tree canopy. President Plunkett of Wilmette, IL has committed to saving monarch butterflies, preserving native pollinators, and making progress on a variety of Village sustainability initiatives. Village Trustees and staff look forward to engaging residents in upkeep and expanding our pollinator habitat throughout Wilmette.

## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

In general, Wilmette is a rather affluent community with no defined lower-income areas. However, the Village is continually partnering with other communities sharing the I-94 corridor to install and maintain native habitats in the public rights-of-way.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

The Village recognizes the importance of the Monarch butterfly and the significance of the decline of Monarch populations. The Village believes that human health ultimately depends on well-functioning ecosystems and that biodiverse regions can better support food production, healthy soil and air quality and can foster health connections between humans and wildlife.

Local volunteers continue to be our best resource, especially when it comes to additional maintenance requirements. Many of these volunteers in our community are dedicated and knowledgeable about native habitats.

Go Green Wilmette, a local environmental nonprofit, hosts a sustainable yard tour each year. This tour features homes in the community that use sustainable landscaping

practices and primarily plant native species. The Village has also worked with a local nursery, Chalet, to help focus on native plants. Chalet hosted a stakeholder open house which included local gardeners, Village staff, and community members to discuss how to advance native plantings in the community. Chalet also helps promote the Village's pollinator habitat yard signs to customers that request or utilize native plants. The Park District has also worked with Midwest Grows Green to better understand how to manage invasive species.

The Park District has been working with Midwest Grows Green, an initiative from the IPM institute of North America, to explore potential ways of managing Lesser Celendine in the community. The Park District continually manages invasive species such as Lesser Celendine, Buckthorn, Reed Canary Grass, Honeysuckle, and many more. Additionally, the Village actively manages invasive species throughout Village plantings. Through the Village's tree ordinance, invasive trees are able to be removed without financial penalty or replacement, which is required for non-invasive, non-diseased species.

In 2024, the Village's Environmental and Energy Commission launched their pollinator habitat yard sign project, which provides Wilmette residents with free yard signs advertising their pollinator habitats to help educate other residents and highlight beneficial habitats in the community. The Commission has continued this effort in 2025 and reordered 70 additional signs to hand out in 2026.
