Pledge Summary

The Borough of Franklin Park is a municipality located in Allegheny County, PA approximately 15 miles north of the City of Pittsburgh. The Borough encompasses 13.5 square miles, has a population of 15,500, and boasts 4 parks and 280 total acres of protected green space. Mayor O'Keefe, Borough Council and the Borough's Environmental Advisory Council are committed to protecting, preserving and enhancing natural areas and are excited about the opportunity to join in supporting and providing education on monarch and pollinator conservation.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Mayor O'Keefe and the Borough Manager were aware of the dramatic decline in monarch butterflies and pollinators in general. When the Borough received an email from a member of the general public encouraging the Mayor to take the Monarch Pledge, the Mayor took that recommendation to Borough Council and received approval to formally take action. The Borough had already begun looking for ways to return section of its parks to a natural state, and this program provides an impetus to make that desire a formal part of the Borough's landscaping and property maintenance.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Simply being able to publicize the fact that the Borough has taken the pledge has helped this year. In the coming years, the Borough will be utilizing the guidance provided by WWF along with engaging the community and seeking grant funding will allow the Borough to implement additional action items and provide further educational opportunities for residents of the Borough and neighboring communities.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The Borough is in the early stages of taking action to address monarch butterfly conservation. This year was the first year that Franklin Park took the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. Effort was focused on introducing the concept to Borough residents and the general public, developing relationships within the community, and beginning the planning process to implement monarch butterfly and pollinator conservation as a formal part of the Borough's Parks and Recreation program. We expect to greatly expand our educational efforts in 2023, as well as continuing to develop our formal plans and constructing our initial garden at the Municipal Building.

Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.

St. John Neumann Care for Creation Committee - they reached out to us in late summer after reading an article in a local newspaper about our taking the Mayor's Monarch Pledge. The Church has an area of property that they currently mow but would like to return to a natural state. We discussed the importance of pollinator plants, and specifically milkweed, and referred them to the Audubon Society of Western PA for guidance on creating a backyard habitat. Franklin Park Borough Parks Department - the Borough stopped mowing a 21-acre property and allowed it to grow naturally.

A local newspaper ran an article about our Mayor's Monarch Pledge. We were then contacted by individuals who were willing to donate milkweed seeds for our program.

The Borough contracted with the Audubon Society of Western PA to do an analysis of a natural area in Old Orchard Park. They determined the area was overgrown with Reed Canary Grass and Japanese Stiltgrass. They recommended the Borough look into a

Prescribed Burn for the area. We expect to take action in early 2023 with the expectation that we can then replant as a bird and pollinator habitat in the spring of 2024.

Educational signage will be installed when the pollinator garden is completed at the Municipal Building in 2023 and when the pollinator and bird habitat is planted in the spring of 2024.

The Borough is currently working with neighboring Ohio Township to complete a Multi-Municipal Comprehensive Plan, which should be completed by the Fall of 2023. At that time, the Borough will then pursue updating its Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Space Plan to incorporate properties purchased since the initial plan was adopted in 2015, and to add an environmental component to the Plan. We will pursue doing this jointly with Ohio Township. We anticipate having this updated Plan completed by the Fall of 2024.
