Pledge Summary

Franklin Park Borough is quiet, safe, residential suburb of 15,500 people located approximately 20 miles north of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The Borough has four active parks and has recently acquired an additional 40 acres of green space to incorporate into the park system. Mayor O'Keefe is committed to monarch and pollinator conservation, and the Borough has begun the process of restoring unused lawn areas on Borough property with native trees, shrubs and pollinator plants, including milkweed.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

We are aware of the dramatic decline of monarch butterflies and this program was a perfect springboard for the Borough to assist in monarch butterfly and pollinator conservation. The Borough is continuing to work on returning large areas of our parks to a natural state and part of our landscaping and property maintenance.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

We were able to raise the public's awareness of the decline of the Monarch Butterfly through the announcement of the Borough taking the Monard Pledge. The Borough will be able to reach more residents and into neighboring communities by utilizing additional social media channels. Grant funding would help in the expansion of returning areas of our parks

to their natural state and using the education resources provided by the NWF to engage our residents and neighboring communities.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Over the past year the Borough has provided three areas where groups have planted or are in the planning process of pollinator gardens to help in the process of the conservation of monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Where is the demonstration garden located and how does this location relate to the cultural significance of the monarch (if relevant)? (Please provide an address or coordinates, if possible)

The active pollinator garden is located at the site of our community garden in Linbrook Park, 2634 Big Sewickley Creek Road, Sewickley, PA 15143. One of the gardens created by local Girl Scouts troops is located in Old Orchard Park at 2219 Rochester Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15237 and will be planted in the spring. The other garden is located at the Franklin Park Municipal Building at 2344 West Ingomar Road, Pittsburgh, PA 15237 and the girls planted the seeds in early November.

Leaders and scouts from two local Girl Scout Troops, Community Garden participants and a Naturalist from the Allegheny County Parks' Latodami Nature Center in North Park.

The Sewickley Valley Garden Club received a grant for a pollinator garden in Linbrook Park. The Borough will be performing the overwintering process of the area. A pollinator garden was started as part of our Community Garden and was active in 2023. The Girl Scout troops reached out to the Borough for assistance in providing the space, planning and layout of a pollinator garden in Old Orchard Park and at the Franklin Park Municipal Building. The Borough prepared the areas and will contribute trees and bushes to the gardens and the girl scouts will be providing the seeds/plants as well as doing the planting. The Naturalist was consulted on the garden at the Municipal Building.

The Borough applied for a DCNR grant to assist with the Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Space Plan but was turned down. We will be working internally throughout 2024 to survey our residents regarding recreation needs and conversion of grass to green stormwater infrastructure, woodlands, and pollinator gardens/meadows. We anticipate utilizing the grant funding for the development of site plans for our parks that incorporates the input received from our residents and environmental stewards, including the Allegheny Land Trust, The Audubon Society of Western PA, the Penn State Master Watershed Stewards, and the Big Sewickley Creek Watershed Association. We look to have the plan completed in the fall of 2025.
