The Borough of Franklin Park is a quiet, safe, residential municipality located in Allegheny County, PA. It is approximately twenty (20) miles north of the City of Pittsburgh, encompasses 13.5 square miles, and has a population of 15,500. The Borough has four parks, 280 total acres of protected green space and continues to work on providing natural habitats, gardens, and meadow areas with the commitment to monarch and pollinator conservation. Mayor O'Keefe, Borough Council, and the Borough's EAC are committed to protecting, preserving, and enhancing natural areas.

The garden club received a grant for a pollinator garden in Linbrook Park. Two Girl Scout Troops planted gardens, one in Old Orchard Park and one at the Municipal Building. The Naturalist consulted the garden at the Municipal Building.

The Borough received a grant from the DCNR to assist with the Comprehensive Recreation, Parks and Open Space Plan. We will be working internally to survey our residents regarding recreation needs and conversion of grass to green stormwater infrastructure, woodlands, and pollinator gardens/meadows. We anticipate utilizing the grant funding for the development of site plans for our parks that incorporates the input received from our residents and environmental stewards, including the Allegheny Land Trust, The Audubon Society of Western PA, the Penn State Master Watershed Stewards, and the Big Sewickley Creek Watershed Association. The plan will be completed in 2026.
