Pledge Summary

Knightdale is a town in eastern Wake County, North Carolina, with a population of approximately 20,000 residents. Our strategic plan highlights SUSTAINABILITY as one of our five core values. We seek to promote the stewardship of our environment. Mayor Day and our Town Council have committed to saving the Monarch Butterfly by joining this pledge.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Communications and Convening

Every new development is asked to use native plantings. Being a town with a population that is 40% African-American, 40% Caucasian, with have a very diverse population. Our park, where our Monarch Garden is located, is adjacent to our lowest-income area in Town.

One of our strategic goals is sustainability. Creating and mainting existing habitat for wildlife helps to meet that goal.
