## Pledge Summary

Trenton is a small town of approximately 1,500 people. It is located at the gateway between the nearest metropolitan area of Ellsworth and Acadia National Park on Mount Desert Island. In 2022 the town planted two small demonstration pollinator gardens, one behind the town office and a second behind the Trenton Elementary School. The Select Board has pledged to help conserve the Monarch butterfly and to encourage its citizens to participate in community activities in relation to pollinator conservation.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

We learned that the Monarch butterfly is in trouble, and that rural Maine communities could make a difference.

We have added a second Maine Master Naturalist to our list of volunteer speaker/experts. We also benefit from information gleaned from related groups on social media and in neighboring communities. We need more access to local sources of native plants.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

This spring and summer were exceptionally rainy which may have affected the population of monarchs. Observations of eggs and caterpillars were spotty until later in the summer.

We are a small group of volunteers and we maintain a mailing list and a facebook page and we organize all of the events. We coordinate with Parks & Rec to communicate with the mowing staff who mow around the garden. They were very accommodating when we decided to expand the town pollinator garden this year.

The native plant and seed swap comprised both this and the previous action. Participants were invited to bring a plant/get a plant or bring seeds/get seeds. The program began with a workshop by one of our Maine Master Naturalists on how to start a pollinator garden, after which she demonstrated and gave participants practice in collecting milkweed and other kinds of native seeds from the town pollinator garden.
