Wheat Ridge uses this program to engage with marginalized communities through a variety of platforms including providing educational materials at events throughout the city, hands-on workshops and events, educational newsletters, and social media posts. Most of the hands-on engagement has taken place in conjunction with the city's Sustainable Neighborhoods Program, with one of the participating neighborhoods being disadvantaged. Hosting events and providing education about pollinators has been an effective way to boost and maintain resident engagement.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Wheat Ridge and our residents take pride in the city's agricultural roots. Residents and organizations alike have shown a strong interest in supporting and protecting urban agriculture, gardening, and pollinators, and Wheat Ridge is dedicated to supporting this.

Wheat Ridge partnered with its community garden (Happiness Community Garden), garden users, and the Jefferson Conservation District to offer the Regenerate Wheat Ridge program which focuses on urban agriculture. Eight workshops were held in person throughout the summer and fall on various topics including "The Perfect Match: Native Plants and Regenerative Ag" and "Peek into a Bee's life" to educate the public. Educational materials are provided in conjunction with each workshop and are also available online.

Please describe your challenge and the results.

Neighborhoods in Wheat Ridge, as part of the Sustainable Neighborhoods Program, participated in several neighborhood projects and events throughout 2022 pertaining to pollinators and native plants: - Native Plant Educational Workshop: one neighborhood partnered with Denver Botanic Gardens to educate participants on how to start, build, and maintain native gardens; the benefits of doing such for pollinators; and which plants are best for our location. This event was so popular that an encore presentation was held several months later. 83 residents participated across the two events. - Garden Tours: one neighborhood hosted a walking garden tour, showcasing local yards that are water-wise and pollinator friendly. 12 residents participated in the garden tours. This is part of a larger, ongoing project in the neighborhood to promote sustainable gardening and pollinator-friendly yards. - An estimated .02 acres of habitat was created within the neighborhood through people doing their own native and pollinator plantings, and we also had several residents take advantage of purchasing Garden In A Box kits which also provide pollinator and native plants. These items were not individual challenges, but neighborhoods participating in the program are required to get a certain number of credits each year to earn either "participating" or "outstanding" certification.
