About 300 square feet of habitat has been created at one of our popular community parks along the green belt trail, and milkweed has been planted in our community garden.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

Wheat Ridge uses this program to engage with marginalized communities through a variety of platforms including providing educational materials at events throughout the city, hands-on workshops and events, educational newsletters, and social media posts. Most of the hands-on engagement has taken place in conjunction with the city's Sustainable Neighborhoods Program, with one of the participating neighborhoods being disadvantaged. Hosting events and providing education about pollinators has been an effective way to boost and maintain resident engagement. Two of these neighborhoods are working on building community demonstration gardens, which will help them to engage further with neighbors.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

Wheat Ridge understands the importance of pollinators, and has heard desire from the community to adopt better, organic land management practices.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Webinars, learning what other communities have been doing, and the free plant grant/program was helpful. It would be great to have more information on grants that might help implement our chosen action items. Marketing toolkit.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

We were successful in providing regular educational materials which has resulted in residents showing a clear interest in promoting and creating native habitats for pollinators and asking the City to reconsider some of its land management practices. We are working on creating native plant demonstration gardens in two of Wheat Ridge's Sustainable Neighborhoods, with planting scheduled for 2024.

Maintained efforts started last year to educate the public about the importance of pollinators and how to garden with native plants and create pollinator-friendly habitat. We hosted an educational and planting event at a local park, and one of Wheat Ridge's Sustainable Neighborhoods has hosted neighborhood events including garden tours. These events typically provide printed educational material. The City also posts a Sustainability Spotlight each month, and has focused on pollinator education, and we provide educational materials across our web platforms.
