Pledge Summary

Elizabeth is a city in northeastern New Jersey with a population of roughly 137,000. The city is located along the New Jersey-New York border, northwest of Staten Island. Home to approximately 46 parks and playgrounds, including the Elizabeth River Trail, Elizabeth Waterfront (Maricante Jackson-Millet Park) and MicroFarm and Environmental Center. Mayor J. Christian Bollwage of Elizabeth, New Jersey, with 3 community partners including Groundwork Elizabeth, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Wildlife Refuge Association among others have officially committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to continuing and expanding upon the current efforts within the city to create pollinator habitat and educate residents on the importance of pollinators for maintaining healthy ecosystems.

Action Items Committed for 2023

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. The City of Elizabeth already has planting ordinances in place throughout the year. The city is working with partners to include milkweed and nectar-creating pollinators in more city centers and streets. The city is continuously dedicated to planting flowers in planters and gardens all over public facilities. The city will be applying for additional funding to plant more milkweeds and nectar plants. 12.31.24 the ordinance has not been formally drafted and signed into legislation and is still in progress of being created. The Mayor's Youth Council will meet with him and the City Councilmen by the end of January to discuss making the proclamation a formal legislative ordinance.
