Pledge Summary

Lake Zurich is a suburban Chicago village with many natural areas, wetlands and oak woodlands that are wonderful habitats for monarchs and other pollinators. It also has residents, a village board and staff who are willing to help save the monarch. With the help of a local conservation group, milkweed and other pollinator plants are being distributed and planted. Frequent educational classes in environmentally friendly landscaping are presented. The Village supports the restoration of local natural areas to improve pollinator habitat. This is a community which cares about our local environment and the plight of the monarch.

Action Items Committed for 2021

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.

We have volunteer workdays 2-3 days a month. Attendees include High school environmental club, HS Interact Club, National Honor Society, church groups, local garden clubs,

Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.

As part of our late summer/fall seed collection efforts on our regularly scheduled volunteer workdays, we collect seeds from up to 70 different native plants species, including 4 types of milkweed, from wetland, emergent, prairie, mesic and woodland species. We then clean, sort and mix them with a matrix. We then spread them on areas that have been newly cleared of invasives. We also distribute milkweeds seeds with planting instructions at any community event that we attend. We also give away milkweed and other pollinator seeds to any donor to the Ancient Oaks Foundation. Attached is a photo of those packets.
