Pledge Summary

The Village of Bull Valley is a small village of 1128 residents, centrally located in McHenry County. A glacial topography, abundant hardwood trees along rural-style roads, and large open spaces with a country feel are characteristics of the Village and evidence of the Village's collective commitment to natural resource protection. The Mayor's Monarch Pledge is a perfect opportunity to expand that commitment to include native pollinators and the native plants they need to thrive.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

Awareness of the Mayors Monarch Pledge and plight of the Monarchs is increasing in the Village overall. At the recent annual dinner meeting of the Environmental Defenders of McHenry County, the Village was a proud recipient of the organization's Local Government

Award for its Outdoor Lighting (Dark Sky) ordinance, its work on the Mayors Monarch Pledge, and its role in the acquisition of the Thompson Road Farm Nature Preserve. This was covered in two local papers and the Defenders newsletter.

How many plants were sold and/or given away at your event?

Thousands of seeds were exchanged. Rather than try to get all the participating Monarch Gardeners together at on spot, the Village hosted an open seed exchange. Participants delivered packaged and labelled envelopes or small packets of home-grown seeds to the Village President's office and were able to exchange the number of packets they brought for the same number of packets someone else brought. The table was loaded with envelopes and packets through the month of October and dwindled down to just a few by at the time of this report. All leftover seed was donated to a member who is restoring a horse pasture to a prairie. eds.

Draft update to zoning code standards will add that restoration of native landscapes including pollinator habitats is expressly permitted and encouraged and will not be penalized or prohibited as long as not encroaching on neighboring yards or public ways. This will go to public hearing in January 2025 and to the Board of Trustees for approval two weeks later.

If this action is In Progress, please describe your progress and a target date when you plan to complete action.

The Village Comprehensive Development and Preservation Plan is under review. Acquisition of more park acreage by the Village has created a need to revise the Parks section of the plan. A new sub-section on the Monarch Butterfly and the Mayor's Monarch Pledge will be inserted into the Section on Parks encouraging inclusion of pollinator gardens, specifically plants that attract Monarchs. One of the Village parks has already incorporated Monarch pollinators in its restoration of a 4-acre oak savannah described in the Village's 2022 Pledge Report. The Plan is scheduled to be available for public comment and set for public hearing in April or May 2025 and be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval by June.
