In December the Village was unexpectedly presented an outreach opportunity. the steward for one of the Village Parks reached out to a two girl scout troops to assist in reseeding some 1.5-2 acres that had been cleared in the prior months of burdock, orchard grass, buckthorn etc. 24 Scouts and leaders assembled on December 6, 2025 and were taught about pollinator species with an emphasis on Monarch Habitat. They were shown how to properly disperse seed under the supervision of the Park Steward.

The Village efforts have helped raise awareness in other groups in the area. The Bull Valley Garden Club initiated a project called the Prairie Promise with a grant from the Garden Clubs of America. The coordinated a planting day with 46 volunteers from six local organizations to plant 1100 native plants at the Thompson Road Preserve.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

This is a continuation of a restoration project that was featured in the Village's 2022 Pledge. Monarch and other pollinator specific species of native plants were seeded after that first clearing. The biggest challenge in 2025 was the appearance of large dense sections of orchard grass which was originally planted to provide pasture for the dairy cows that were kept there previously. A consultant was hired who recommended an herbicide targeted to orchard grass. Also in 2025 overgrown vegetation under the Oaks and Hickories adjacent to the original three acres was mowed and will be herbicided to remove burdock and other invasives and aggressive plants like garlic mustard, multiflora rose, giant ragweed, and bittersweet. It will be planted after a burn with sedges and selected pollinators. The estimated acreage cleared under the trees is approximately 1.5 to 2 acres. The open area around the tree "islands" is still being hayed by a local farmer. Stewards Michael Gallery and Donna Hriljac reached out to local Girl Scouts from the Chippewa Service Unit of Crystal Lake and on December 6, 2025, twenty-four young people, leaders and parents assembled in the cold at the park for a brief talk on seed stratification and winter seeding techniques. The scouts were divided into teams and assigned pre-marked sections where they spread more Monarch/pollinator seed before heading back to the parking lot for hot apple cider and snacks. Each scout received a Monarch button pin memento and thank-you card.
