The Town has identified a pollinator garden at Hilltop Needmore Town Park and Preserve in a proposed park master plan, and has also planted various pollinators in Town parks and civic grounds. We have heard about others aware of the initiative planting their own habitats on private property but have no way of tracking plantings by private property owners.

How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?

We have shared information about pollinators with schools and low income communities, and hope to use the pollinator garden in a large public park as an educational resource.

What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?

An elementary school class wrote to our Mayor requesting that he take the Mayors' Monarch Pledge.

What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?

Milkweed/pollinator seed kits or plantings could be provided to community centers and faith based organizations serving low income communities, to encourage residents (especially children) to plant these at home.

What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?

The Town is very focused on environmental conservation and education at our 143 acre Hilltop Needmore Town Park and Preserve that is currently in the final stages of master planning, as well as Carroll Howard Johnson Environmental Education Park.
