The Village of Lincolnwood is located approximately 10 miles north of downtown Chicago and serves as the gateway to Chicagoland's North Shore. It is a diverse community of 12,590 residents, with tree-lined streets, beautiful neighborhoods and parks, an excellent school system, and prosperous business community. The Village commitment to monarch's is strong through efforts to improve or create new native plantings and communications related to sustainable landscaping in the Village's parks, trails, and right of ways.

Action Items Committed for 2025

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.

Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

Systems Change

- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats.

Staff reviewed current mowing/pesticide practices and provided a recommendation to slightly adjust mowing programs throughout the Village's parks and right of way. While it has not been reviewed or approved by the Village Board as of yet, the Parks and Recreation Board provided a recommendation to move forward with maintaining current practices, with the understanding that Public Works and Parks may raise the mower height in trials areas to reduce weeds, and improve the turf areas.
