## Pledge Summary

The City of Charlotte provides services to more than 860,000 residents. The city's focus areas are Community Safety, Housing and Neighborhood Development, Economic Development, Environment and Transportation & Planning. Charlotte is guided by the following mission: "Charlotte will lead as a global city by continuously improving, protecting, and preserving the environment, its community, and economy, while ensuring equity and resilience - for today's and future generations." In addition, the Charlotte Future 2040 Comprehensive Plan, adopted in 2021, states: "Charlotte will protect and enhance its surface water quality, tree canopy, and natural areas with a variety of trees, plantings, green infrastructure, green building practices, and open space at different scales throughout the entire community as a component of sustainable city infrastructure that addresses the threat of climate change." Lastly, in 2018, Charlotte City Council unanimously adopted the Strategic Energy Action Plan, and since then Charlotte has been taking bold action to strive towards a low-carbon, sustainable, resilient and equitable future.

## Action Items Committed for 2022

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Convert vacant lots to monarch habitat.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.

- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.
- Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat.

- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

In one of the corridors, We recently worked with a community near Camp North End to install a pollinator garden (including host species for monarchs) in a median to honor Daryl Gaston who was a beloved citizen and community organizer.

The City of Charlotte recognizes that human health ultimately depends on well-functioning ecosystems and that biodiverse regions can better support food production, healthy soil and air quality and can foster healthy connections between humans and wildlife.

Working with the wildlife federation on pollinator plants through their office. Identifying additional funding for ongoing maintenance would be helpful in reaching our goals long term as well. We have received a lot of positive feedback about the pollinator spaces created. Both from the public and other city staff.

Charlotte's Tree Canopy Preservation Program (TCPP) seeks to acquire and conserve land within Charlotte with the goal of preserving and protecting one of the Queen City's most important natural resources: its nationally recognized tree canopy. In 2020, the City of Charlotte partnered with the Catawba Lands Conservancy on placing approximately 19

acres under a conservation easement. The parcel is an old farm property owned by the Spears family. Hardwood and riparian areas are made up of American beech, sweetgum, white oak, red oak, red maple, tulip poplar, virginia pine and loblolly pine. The property is located adjacent to multiple tree save parcels, bringing the total contiguous protected area to 45 acres. Invasives that were removed include: Porcelain Berry, Chinese Privet, Autumn Olive, Chinese Wisteria, Japanese Honeysuckle, Mimosa, and Kudzu. Techniques used to remove the invasive plants included cutting and treating stumps, "hack and squirt", and foliar spray. This site will be monitored bi-annually to determine if subsequent treatments will be needed to maintain the site free of invasives.
