Larchmont Village is located in Westchester County, NY. The population of the Village was at 6630 as of the 2020 census. Larchmont has a total of 7 municipal parks and 1 privately-held, public park. The Village of Larchmont recently passed a native plants and trees resolution to encourage the planting of more native species on municipal grounds. By signing this pledge we look forward to engaging our local residents in creating more pollinator habitats throughout the Village.

The location of the restoration site (and the community in which participants planted in their own gardens) is frequented by migrating Monarchs along the North Atlantic Coastline just above New York City. The area has an urban-level population density and has lost the vast majority of open space and native habitat. The restoration of Monarch/pollinator habitat via the restoration has made a significant addition to the pollinator habitat in the municipality.

**How are you leveraging the Mayors' Monarch Pledge program to engage marginalized communities, such as low-income communities or communities of color?**

We advertise through social media and community newsletters, as well as perform outreach to schools and other regional organizations, to ensure this information can be reached by all populations.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

Larchmont has a rich history of environmental action and conservation. The Larchmont-Mamaroneck Pollinator Pathways and Larchmont Environmental Committee are very active in organizing community events and bringing action through local organizations and the Village of Larchmont when it comes to initiatives such as the Mayors' Monarch Pledge.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

We'd be interested in getting milkweed/pollinator seed kits or plantings to provide to a wider range of community groups, aside from the environmentally-focused and government organizations. Also, materials for schools would be great to share as well!

A pollinator-supporting ecological restoration was implemented/planted at a local park (Kane Park) in a prominent location (close to Village Hall and adjacent to a heavily traveled road) including the planting of a diversity of local ecotype Common and Rose/Swamp Milkweed and other native plant species

Communications were sent to approximately 500 Larchmont community members on the benefits of growing native plants (including to support pollinators and reverse the critical loss of biodiversity) together with invitations to receive free native plant seeds (including Milkweed and other Monarch food sources) and attend a training session on how to stratify the seeds for planting in the spring.
