## Pledge Summary

The City of Boise is the capital of Idaho, located in the southwest area of the state, with about 230,000 residents. The city is known for its easy access to a wide variety of recreational opportunities, from biking along the Boise River Greenbelt to hiking in the nearby foothills to skiing at Bogus Basin. Mayor McLean has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with her signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to continuing the work of creating a clean and healthy city for everyone.

## Action Items Committed for 2023

### Communications and Convening

- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.
- Initiate or support community science (or citizen science) efforts that help monitor monarch migration and health.
- Add or maintain native milkweed and nectar-producing plants in gardens in the community.
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

Although we haven't had the opportunity to create events specifically for marginalized communities, some of our events take place in a small public library branch which does provide services for many in this category. Volunteer projects are open to anyone regardless of privilege and take place in communities spread geographically across the city. We collaborated with a local school-based community center to install a pollinator garden that will impact many low-income and marginalized community members.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

As with the rest of the country, monarch sighting are much fewer than in years past. The monarch is our state insect, and we are highly motivated to increase safe habitat for them before it's too late.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

We have access to and we utilize many great educational and citizen science resources. What we lack, in some cases, is cooperation with outside entities (those that mow public spaces, those that spray pesticides, etc.). Regardless of many attempts, we haven't been successful in making some of these desired changes in the community.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

It's been a rewarding experience, and we plan to continue on! Momentum and awareness are building across the community.

## Selected Action Items

**Plant milkweed and pollinator-friendly native nectar plants along roadsides, medians, or public rights-of-way.**

Native pollinator plants and shrubs were installed in a right-of-way adjacent to Terry Day Park at 2000 W. Overland Road, Boise, Idaho. Due to staffing challenges, we were not able to plant as many right-of-way sites as planned.

Volunteers with the Parks, Monarchs, and Milkweeds (chrome-extension://efaidnbnmnnibpcajpcgclcfindmkaj/https://www.cityofboise.org/media/1553/monarch-field-guide-for-print.pdf ) program monitored milkweed in Boise parks and open space habitats for milkweed phenology, abundance, and quality as well as for monarch eggs, larvae, and adults. Data were submitted to the Western Monarch Milkweed Mapper.

Boise Parks and Recreation collaborated with the Whitney Community Center to install a new sensory focused Pollinator garden at their site located on the campus of Whitney Elementary. Three of the pollinator gardens in the Boise Parks and Recreation system were expanded utilizing native, pollinator friendly plants.

**What is the total acreage of land treated to remove invasive plants?**

**Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.**

In collaboration with the Golden Eagle Audubon Society, contractors were hired to remove Russian olive trees from a park site along the Boise River. Additionally, volunteer and Boise Parks and Recreation staff continued to hand pull several noxious weeds including houndstongue (*Cynoglossum officinale*), jointed goatgrass (*Aegilops cylindrica*), poison hemlock (*Conium maculatum*), spotted knapweed (*Centaurea stoebe*), puncturevine (*Tribulus terrestris*) and more at several project sites. When necessary and appropriate, chemical treatments were utilized to control noxious weeds such as rush skeletonweed (*Condrilla juncea*) and whitetop (*Lepidium draba*). Weed identification workshops and other resources were provided for volunteers with the Golden Eagle Audubon Society, the Boise Parks and Recreation Adopt a Habitat Program, and the Boise Parks and Recreation Adopt the Greenbelt Program.

We have maintained the Facebook Group "Idaho Friends of Monarchs" and group numbers have grown in 2023. In this group we share and discuss pollinator gardens, monarch education, news about monarchs, and monarch sightings.

In the Facebook group "Idaho Friends of Monarchs", and often cross posted on other local gardening forums, we share photos of native milkweeds and talk about pollinator/monarch plants, and also offer free seeds or seedling giveaways.

Approximately a dozen Adopt the Greenbelt groups planted milkweed seeds along their adopted habitat sections. The Pollinator Posse maintained and enhanced 6 pollinator gardens, adding milkweed plants and other pollinator friendly plants to each one. Five Adopt a Habitat groups planted 140 milkweed plants, and thousands of seeds. Golden Eagle Audubon Society volunteers grew and planted approximately 2000 milkweed plants throughout shared public open spaces. Boise Parks and Recreation continues to work to include more native, pollinator friendly plants throughout planting beds in parks. Boise Parks and Recreation has also been making significant changes to

mowing and pesticide use in parks as part of the Pesticide Reduction Program.

Open Arms Dance Project, a community of dancers with diverse bodies, ages, and abilities, created a monarch migration themed dance that was performed at two separate Dia de los Muertos events at Jack's Urban Meeting Place (JUMP), a free public venue. The first performance was preceded by a 30 minute presentation on monarch cultural significance, migration and biology.

Boise Public Library milkweed seedling giveaway in 2023: 100+ plants. Boise Parks & Recreation: milkweed and native seed giveaway included several native species of pollinator plants as well as Showy milkweed. Seed giveaways took place at several events throughout the fall.

Seed and/or seedling giveaways were held in tandem with efforts from the Boise Parks & Recreation, and the Boise Public Library.

**Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.**

On multiple occasions in fall 2023, Pollinator Posse volunteers collected native milkweed seed from pollinator gardens across the city. Seed was processed by Master Naturalists and packaged to be distributed throughout the

community. Golden Eagle Audubon Society volunteers collected local milkweed seed which was then propagated by volunteers to be utilized at restoration sites along the Boise River. Approximately 2,900 plants were propagated. Alene Hortin from the Library! at Hillcrest collected native milkweed seed and propagated plants that were distributed to the community through the library and other avenues.
