## Pledge Summary

Located just 14 miles from downtown Atlanta, Chamblee is a vibrant urban city with a diverse community and international flair. The City of Chamblee began as a small rail town and was incorporated in 1908. Through multiple annexations, the City has grown to more than 7 square miles and 29,000 residents. Mayor Clarkson of Chamblee, Georgia is committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the city.

## Action Items Committed for 2021

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. Native Swamp Milkweed was added to an existing rain garden within one of Chamblee's parks. The rain garden was seeded with a native wildflower mix but did not include milkweed species. A water-loving variety of milkweed (*Asclepias incarnata*) was added to supplement and help support Monarch species.

Keep Chamblee Beautiful volunteers and City Parks & Recreation staff will mow the areas twice per year at appropriate times (late winter and early summer) and monitor for invasive non-native species that may require removal.

**Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.**

**Please describe the extent of engagement with these groups and revisions/maintenance implemented for mowing or planting programs.**

Keep Chamblee Beautiful (KCB) engaged with the City of Chamblee Parks & Recreation and Public Works departments to implement a Wildflower Project Plan in a portion of the sewer easement within Keswick Park in Chamblee. This was a half-acre area of an old-growth forest that the county watershed department clear-cut in December 2019 as part of a sewer upgrade project. Following completion of that work, the area was re-seeded with annual ryegrass, which had died by summer of 2020, and weeds and other invasive species were beginning to re-establish in the area. KCB volunteers approached the two city departments with a plan to install a wildflower meadow that would require minimal mowing and would provide food and nectar sources for pollinators and birds. The city departments reviewed and approved KCB's plan, assisted with the initial seeding of the plot, developed temporary and permanent signage for the area, and coordinated with the city's landscape contractor to not mow/blow/spray the area while it was being established.
