Pledge Summary

Chamblee is a city located northeast of Atlanta with a population of roughly 30,000. The city is home to nine parks and a linear trail called "the rail trail". Mayor Mock of Chamblee, GA has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with the signing of the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2022

Systems Change

- Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Remove milkweed from the list of noxious plants in city weed / landscaping ordinances (if applicable).
- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with community garden groups and urge them to plant native milkweeds and nectar-producing plants.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. (If you have community members who speak a language other than English, we encourage you to also communicate in that language; Champion Pledges must communicate in that language.)

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.

- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

The provided attachment and photos document Chamblee and Keep Chamblee Beautiful's combined efforts to meet action items 2, 10 and 19 at two public events in April that, together, involved education, milkweed giveaways and community pollinator/milkweed plantings. We also ran a social media campaign during Pollinator Week in June to encourage people to share photos of their favorite pollinator plants. Other partners were the Georgia Native Plant Society and Murphey Candler Park Conservancy.

Two invasive species events were conducted during 2022. The first was in February when approximately 1 acre of Chinese privet was removed by cutting along a streambank in Huntley Hills Park. The second was in November when approximately 2 acres of Eleagnus pungens was cut and painted with a herbicide in Keswick Park.
