Pledge Summary

Chamblee is a vibrant urban city located just 14 miles from downtown Atlanta with a population of roughly 30,000 residents. The city is located within the piedmont region of the state and is home to 10 parks and the Chamblee Rail Trail. Mayor Mock has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators with his signing of the Mayors' Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitat throughout the city.

Action Items Committed for 2024

Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters, other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.
- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.
- Engage with developers, planners, landscape architects, and other community leaders and organizers engaged in planning processes to identify opportunities to create monarch habitat.
- Create a community art project to enhance and promote monarch and pollinator conservation as well as cultural awareness and recognition.
- Launch or maintain a public communication effort to encourage residents to plant monarch gardens at their homes or in their neighborhoods. - Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city’s Park Master Plan, Sustainability Plan, Climate Resiliency Plan or other city plans.
- Reduce or eliminate the use of herbicides, pesticides, or other chemicals that are harmful to monarchs and pollinators and urban wildlife.
- Launch, expand, or continue one or more ordinances to reduce light pollution to benefit urban wildlife.

The ongoing HHE school garden maintenance project benefits a Title I school that serves a diverse and underserved population, including immigrants and those with special needs. Of the 600 students, 47% are Latino and 21% are African-American.

Chamblee's citizens are firmly committed to sustainability and care of the environment. A continuing commitment to the Mayor's Monarch Pledge is a natural activity for our citizens and government.

The Grounds & Greenspace Division worked with the Parks & Recreation Department to continue to maintain previously installed pollinator habitat in several parks and added two new large rain gardens in Arrow Creek Park. The division also established a property maintenance agreement this year with the Downtown Development Authority and, through selective mowing, allowed a meadow to develop in a vacant lot in downtown Chamblee.

The lot was mowed in the early spring and summer, and was allowed to grow up after July 4 for fall-blooming flowers to emerge and flower during the fall migration time. The city plans to continue this program moving forward as long as the lot remains undeveloped.

The City of Chamblee commissioned SEFAA to honor the City's commitment to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators, and artist Katrina Stone rose to the challenge, creating string art zinnias, milkweed, and cone flowers along with fabric monarch butterflies. It was unveiled in late 2023 and is expected to be up for several years. Multiple other murals have been painted throughout the city that feature Monarch butterflies, and these will be featured in future MMP reports.

A group of parents have been trained on garden maintenance and utilize a Google chat to coordinate schedules. At minimum, several volunteers meet weekly to water and weed. Quarterly PTA campus-wide workdays focus on heavier pruning and maintenance.

Huntley Hills Elementary garden has NWF and Monarchs Across Georgia signage, the public art on the bridge near the old city hall pollinator garden has a sign, and the Village Park Rain Garden has a sign. New signage is under development for other areas of the city.

In 2024, Chamblee treated a total of approximately 5 acres of land to remove invasive kudzu.

Please describe the extent of revisions or maintenance to invasive species removal programs, as well as the practices or techniques used to remove the invasive plants.

During 2024, Chamblee focused on continuing treatment of kudzu in parks with a selective herbicide that targets kudzu and does not harm beneficial vegetation. Also, whenever right-of-way vegetation is controlled, the public works staff takes the opportunity to evaluate whether invasive species are present (typically privet and Eleagnus or wisteria), and uses a cut-and-treat method to apply systemic herbicides to the cut stumps and minimize impacts to beneficial vegetation.

Residents of the Janice Ct cul-de-sac neighborhood complained about overuse of herbicide in maintaining a grassed roundabout on their street. The public works division has directed the landscaping company maintaining the area to cease using herbicides in this area, and plans are underway to eliminate the grass and install a pollinator garden in this area with signage; neighbors have agreed to assist with watering the garden during establishment. The Huntley Hills Neighborhood Association maintains a pollinator garden in one of Chamblee's city parks, with assistance from the Public Works division on plant installation and maintenance.

A 2023 streambank restoration project in Chamblee's Dresden Park, which was conducted by several firms engaged by the city council, involved the seeding of a 3-acre wildflower meadow along the bank of Arrow Creek, which has bloomed with various beneficial pollinator plants, including butterfly weed as shown in the attached photo. Additionally, other beneficial plantings are being installed along new walking paths through the downtown area. The Public Works department also incorporates new pollinator plants in all of the city's five green infrastructure practices each season, such as the beautiful buttonbush shown blooming in Spring 2024 in the Village Park Bioswale.
