## Action Items Committed for 2025

### Communications and Convening

- Engage with Homeowners Associations (HOAs), Community Associations or neighborhood organizations to identify opportunities to plant monarch gardens and revise maintenance and mowing programs.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.
- Earn or maintain recognition for being a wildlife-friendly city by participating in other wildlife and habitat conservation efforts (i.e., National Wildlife Federation's Community Wildlife Habitat program).
- Launch, expand, or continue an invasive species removal program that will support the re-establishment of native habitat for monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

## Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Launch, expand, or continue one or more ordinances to reduce light pollution to benefit urban wildlife.

the program and provide literature on what steps the City is taking and we provide a list of steps showing what they can do to help.

The City of Coconut Creek is trademarked as the "Butterfly Capital of the World" and is seriously committed to butterfly conservation. Signing on to the Pledge is a natural continuation of our efforts to protect butterflies and educate the public about their ecological importance.

Having the Mayor and City Commissioners speak directly with residents at our Tree Giveaway event has been effective. We give away native milkweed seeds, and encourage residents to plant native milkweed in their yards.

Issuing a MMP Proclamation also helps our efforts as it is read at a Commission meeting and is posted for all to see.

The lighting code was updated on 7-23-2015 to encourage the use of wildlife-friendly lighting, i.e. bulbs in the visible spectrum (four hundred (400) to seven hundred (700) nanometers).

The last revisions to the landscape code were codified in Sept 2023 and the minimum percentage of native plants to be installed on each project is 50%.

A representative from our Landscape Division, together with a member of Code Compliance, attended 6 HOA meetings during 2025 whereby we encouraged the preservation of trees, the planting of wildlife habitats, eradicating invasive plants, planting native species, and conserving water.

At the beginning of the summer, our Landscape Division met with the Public Works Department and discussed mowing practices and maintenance. This information was also shared with our hired maintenance contractor.

Public Works has an ongoing maintenance program to eradicate invasive plants from City-owned or managed sites. We work with HOAs and private property owners, mainly through the code compliance process, to have privately-owned natural areas and sites managed.
