## Pledge Summary

Lakeland is a city in Central Florida with a current population of 117,281 and a population growth of 1.48%. Lakeland is located just south of the Green Swamp Wilderness Preserve and has 38 named lakes within its city limits. Lakeland prides itself in having 76 park facilities and an urban forest consisting of 65,000 plus trees. Hollis Garden, Lakeland's downtown botanical display garden, is a Certified Butterfly Garden with the North American Butterfly Association (NABA) and many other park areas throughout the city are dedicated to native plantings that provide habitats for Monarch Butterflies and other pollinators. Mayor Mutz of Lakeland, Florida has committed to saving the monarch butterfly and other pollinators by signing the Mayor's Monarch Pledge and looks forward to engaging residents in building more pollinator habitats throughout the city.

## Action Items Committed for 2022

### Communications and Convening

- Issue a proclamation to raise awareness about the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat. This proclamation must incorporate a focus on monarch conservation.
- Engage with city parks and recreation, public works, sustainability, and other relevant staff to identify opportunities to revise and maintain mowing programs and milkweed / native nectar plant planting programs.
- Engage with gardening leaders and partners (e.g., Master Naturalists, Master Gardeners, Nature Centers, Native Plant Society Chapters , other long-standing and influential community leaders) to support monarch butterfly conservation.

### Program and Demonstration Gardens

- Host or support a native seed or plant sale, giveaway or swap.
- Facilitate or support a milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.
- Plant or maintain a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at City Hall or another prominent or culturally significant community location.

### Systems Change

- Increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Launch, expand, or continue an effort to change municipal planting ordinances and practices to include more native milkweed and native nectar producing plants at city properties.

The newest renovation/replanting of one of our butterfly gardens took place at the Coleman Bush Building. This recreation facility is located in a lower income neighborhood and provides after-school activities for the local neighborhood children. We have done butterfly releases for the children at this particular facility in the past.

**What was your community's motivation for taking and continuing to work on the Mayors' Monarch Pledge?**

We have established butterfly gardens throughout the city limits. The mayor's pledge incentivized us to focus more specifically on Monarchs. This helped to reinforce what we were already doing.

**What resources have been most helpful to you thus far and what new resources would you like to see to help meet your goals? What resources would be useful to help expand equitable engagement in community processes and access to high-quality, usable nature?**

Local native plant nurseries have provided Monarch specific plants for our various butterfly gardens. We would like to find growers that could provide rarer *Asclepias* species and rarer nectar plants for our garden collections. Better advertising and understanding of our collaboration with the National Wildlife Federation, in regard to the Mayor's Pledge, would potentially help with community engagement.

**What else should we know about your monarch butterfly conservation efforts over the last year?**

1) Monarch specific plants (*Asclepias perrenis*, *Liatris gracilis*, *Liatris spicata* & *Liatris tenuifolia*) are currently growing on display at our downtown botanical garden, Hollis Garden. 2) The following Monarch specific plants are growing in situ at our City of Lakeland municipal nursery for the purposes of seed collection, propagation, and installation into municipal landscapes: (*Asclepias incarnata*, *Asclepias perennis*, *Asclepias verticillata*, *Carphephorus odorotissimus*, *Carphephorus corymbosus*, *Flaveria linearis*, *Heliotropium angiospermum*, *Liatris gracilis*, *Liatris spicata*, *Liatris tenuifolia*, *Melanthera nivea*, *Silphium asteriscus* & *Symphotrichum elliottii*)

On 9/8/22 the Landscape Crew and Lake Crago Maintenance Crew dispersed *Asclepias incarnata* (Swamp Milkweed) in a retention area of Lake Crago Park. This area normally is bush hogged or mowed several times per year. Because of the seed dispersal, this will cease unless plants are in a dormant phase. We are currently monitoring this area.

**Please describe the milkweed seed collection and propagation effort that you hosted.**

On May 26th, 2022 we established a Monarch-specific garden at the City of Lakeland Nursery. This garden consists of *Asclepias incarnata*, *Asclepias perennis* & *Asclepias verticillata* for host plants and seed sources. We also planted an array of Monarch attracting nectar plants for seeds and vegetative production - they include the following : *Carphephorus corymbosus*, *Carphephorus odorotissimus*, *Flaveria linearis*, *Heliotropium angiospermum*, *Liatris gracilis*, *Liatris spicata*, *Liatris tenuifolia*, *Melanthera nivea*, *Silphium asteriscus* & *Symphotrichum elliottii*. Seeds were collected from the *Asclepias perennis* and *Silphium asteriscus* specimens in the afore mentioned garden and in Hollis Garden. The seeds were then sprouted and grown at the City of Lakeland Nursery for both distribution to the public and the city-wide landscape.

The Landscape Crew regularly plants throughout the city-wide landscape. See attachment - native species in the 'Tree Species', 'Hedge Species' & 'Palm/Lg. Herbaceous Perennials' columns will be highlighted in purple cells. The tally will be listed at the bottom of the spreadsheet under 'Native Species Planted'. Although not Monarch-related, the Florida Coontie is the sole host plant for the Atala Butterfly caterpillars (*Eumaeus atala*) which was once declared extinct in Florida. We have been planting the coonties back into the municipal landscape since the 90's.

This butterfly attracting garden is located at the City of Lakeland Coleman Bush Recreation Facility located at 1104 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd in Lakeland. Butterfly attracting nectar plants are located throughout the landscape including milkweeds as host plants. This location is specified as one of our multiple Butterfly Gardens. Other areas dedicated to butterflies include Hollis Garden (702 E Orange St.), Common Ground Park (1000 E Edgewood Dr.) & City Hall (228 S Massachusetts Ave).
